Lord Dufferin has received a Marquisate for his admirable conduct of affairs at Constantinople.

The Shiekhs who were arrested at Tanta for exciting the populace to massacre foreign residents, have each been sentenced to receive a hundred lashes. A large quantity of arms was discovered at Tanta. The watch has been doubled.

News has been received of the execution of four natives this morning, at Damanshour, on a charge of murder.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

The Times Constantinople despatch says Lord Dufferin in reply to the Porte's letter in relation to the withdrawal of the British troops from Egypt, says a portion of the British force has already left Egypt and that the Government desires the remainder shall follow as soon as possible. England has made great sacrifices to pacify the country and must take measures to secure permanency of the pacification. The temporary presence of a certain number of British troops will be necessary.

PARIS, Oct. 9.

The Republique Francaise refuses to believe that Lord Granville will set aside the Egyptian control without consulting France.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 9.

Gov. Jabou Kalski, of the district of Eastern Siberia, has been murdered at Ichitas.

LONDON, Oct. 9.

A despatch to the Sportsman from Melbourne says in the Punch Regatta on the Parramatta River Rush came first, Beach, Laycock and Trickett finishing in the order named.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.

The Australian cricket team arrived last night and will play at Hoboken to-day.

BUFFALO, Oct. 9.

The officers of the Irish National Land League have issued a circular to the public relative to the statement made that the Land League is no longer in existence, emphatically protesting against it, and declaring that the League is in full life and strength.
