

Charlottetown Needs 545 "Life Savers" At Clinic Today

The response at yesterday's afternoon and evening sessions of the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic being held at the Clover Club was slow as only 250 donors were registered during the four hours—90 in the afternoon and 160 in the evening. This makes a total of 955 who have registered during the past three days and leaves a balance of 545 still required to reach the objective of 1500.

This number can quite easily be accommodated during the six hours that the clinic will be open—10-12 this morning, 2-4 this afternoon, and 7 to 9 this evening. It is to be hoped that the Clinic Staff will be kept busy during the morning and afternoon, as well as the evening with an attendance of at least 150 in the morning, another 150 in the afternoon, and the remaining 245 at night. If the attendance can be spaced in this way, there will be no waits for anyone, and the objective will be reached.

Helpers at yesterday's Clinics were provided by the following groups: Ladies' Auxiliary of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, Basilez Sub-division of the Catholic Women's League Red Cross Corps and Staff, Red Cross High School Members from Rochford Square School, and the Nurses' Association.

Today will be the last opportunity for residents of Charlottetown and the surrounding districts to play a part in keeping the Blood Transfusion Service operating efficiently until next December when another series will be held in the city.

Weather permitting, it is understood the 1957 Spring Car Parade will be staged this afternoon by Dealers Association and the Sea and Air Cadets, accompanied by the Queen Charlotte High School Band will be out on parade early this evening to lend an air of festivity to the last evening of the Blood Donor Clinic.
