

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## TERRIBLY SUDDEN DEATH.

Special despatch to the Examiner

HALIFAX, Sept. 10.

The community was shocked this morning by the announcement of the sudden death, at Londonderry, of Mr. James B. Morrow, of the firm of Cunard & Morrow, and agent of Allan Line steamers at this port.

Mr. Morrow left the city last evening with Sir Leonard Tilley, Sir A. Campbell, and Sir E. Kenny, to visit the Londonderry Iron mines. Shortly after arriving there, he was taken suddenly ill, believed to be rheumatism of the heart, and died in two hours.

Mr. Morrow was one of the most honorable and esteemed citizens of Halifax. His word was his bond. He had for years taken part in every religious, moral and philanthropic object.

He was a leading member of the Brunswick-street Methodist Church, and ex-President of the Y. M. C. A. He only recently returned from a visit to New Brunswick, where he spent some time on Y. M. C. A. business. He was agent of the General Mining Association.

His fearfully sudden death, at the age of 47 years, has cast a gloom over the entire city.

His body was brought to the city this evening. Funeral takes place Monday afternoon.

## EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

Sir Charles Tupper and Messrs. Carron, Dennis and Pope sailed to-day in steamer Circassian from Liverpool for Canada. Sir Alexander T. Galt and Sir John McDonald will sail Thursday for Canada.

The London correspondent of the Edinburgh Scotsman says: "Controversies between England and France respecting French encroachments on west coast of Africa have been complicated by some high handed proceedings of French commandant on Mallicou river. These vexatious acts are probably intended to worry England into ceding Gambia to France, an object which every French government for many years past has steadfastly pursued."

BERLIN, Sept. 9.

A semi-official statement reasserts that in no case has the Imperial Bank of Germany in Berlin refused to pay gold for its notes or cheques, nor will it.

PERA, Sept. 9.

The Arabs who attacked the English steamer of Khali at have been captured.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 9.

Ninety-six Kurdish chiefs, charged with murder and robbery in Armenia, have escaped from the internment at Aleppo. Baker Pasha ineffectually recommended that they be imprisoned instead of interned.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 9.

Princess Orloff, wife of Prince Nicholas, the present head of the family, is dead.

## UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.

The cost of Manhattan market in 1871 was \$1,300,000. In 1873 it passed into the hands of the late Courtlandt Palmer on a mortgage of \$150,000, the Market Company having been embarrassed almost from the very beginning of the scheme to conduct the largest market in the world.

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 9.

Deputy Sheriff Geo. Gleason was shot four times fatally in an attempt to arrest a gang of horse thieves.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.

Aux Cayes, Hayti, was visited by the same hurricane which swept Jamaica. The coffee trees suffered very much. There is little loss of life, although much valuable property was destroyed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.

Advices from the British island of Grenada, West Indies, says that a boat with a company of cricketers and some ladies, which left for Granville, foundered. Eight adults and one infant were only saved.

In the dress circle of the Melbourne Opera House, on the 24th, during a performance of the Hugonots, a new arrival, McGregor Grier, maddened by jealousy, shot his own wife and M. Salandry, a member of the French commission, and himself. The former two are recovering. Grier has since died.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA., Sept. 9.

The mail agent from the New Smyrna reports the arrival of six shipwrecked mariners who cannot speak English. They are supposed to be Norwegians.

The Oriona Rabbit, another wreck, has also drifted ashore north of Cape Canaveral.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 9.

A passenger train on Indianapolis and St. Louis Railroad, due here this morning from St. Louis, was thrown from the track. Four coaches were derailed. Accident was caused by removal of rail. Conductor Geo. Morris was killed. No others were seriously injured. The place selected was four miles west of Terrehaute, a desolate locality where the road crossed a bridge over a deep ravine. It was evidently the intention of the wreckers to throw the entire train in to the ravine. Fortunately this disaster was avoided though the car was on the brink of the ravine. The parties suspected of this crime are being searched for.

MINERALS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Telegraph says: "A manganese deposit has been discovered on the Judson Peak farm at Hope well Hill, Albert County."

TOO MUCH MARRIED.—Yesterday, Rev. J. F. Betts, Methodist minister at Sussex, went to Truro to give evidence of a marriage ceremony performed by him on 8th of November last between one J. H. McLeod, of Truro, and Flora Cribb, of North River, Onslow. After the marriage, McLeod and his wife went to Truro to live, where they have since resided. Some time ago a woman from Halifax made things unpleasant by claiming to be Mrs. McLeod No. 1. Her story was so good that the authorities at Truro had McLeod arrested for bigamy. The examination takes place this morning. McLeod is an engine driver on the I. C. R.—Post.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—Last evening was set apart for a complimentary benefit to Harry Lindley, which several of our townsmen had tendered, but we regret to say the weather proved a too formidable adversary, as the house was not good. This is to be regretted, as it was the best performance of the season, so far. The "Rose of Killarney" is a purely legendary Irish drama, and is full of humour and song. Mr. L. J. Williams sang admirably, and gave "McCarthy's Mare" to the delectation of all. Some of the songs did not accord with the leader, in fact there seemed to be a difference of opinion as regards key. The finale of the first act was the most uproarious scene of Irish fun we have witnessed. The piece will be repeated by desire this evening, and should draw a full house, as it is worthy of patronage. The management offers strong attractions next week. Monday—"Lady Audley's Secret," which is undoubtedly Miss Braddon's most sensational work, and in which Mr. Claude appears as George Talboys. Tuesday—by desire—"East Lynne." Wednesday—"Lord Lovel" and "Nancy Bell Burlesque," in which a trained pony is introduced. On Monday week we are promised the "Two Orphans," in elaborate style.

The attendance at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, both of prisoners and spectators, was unusually large and the offences ranged from simple cases of drunkenness to a serious assault case. Two common drunks were first disposed of—one of the offenders being discovered by the police, at one o'clock this morning, fast asleep at the corner of Pownall and Kent Streets. Next followed two cases under the category of "drunk and driving disorderly" which were summarily disposed of. Then came the assault in which a boy named John McCabe led. John it appears, was following some other boys with whom he wanted to settle an old score, when a Mrs. Keenan followed him to see what he was about, whereupon John asked her an impudent question, and ungallantly called her an obscene name. Mrs. Keenan was the only appearance against him, and while she swore that John used most obscene language towards her, John asserted that she "commenced it" and was always at variance with her neighbors. John was fined \$1 or 4 days. Michael Purcell was next called for an assault on Mrs. Keziah Brown, (colored from West End). Michael it appears on Thursday last, entered Mrs. Brown's residence having with him a bottle of liquor. He asked Mrs. Brown to partake of the ardent. She refused to do so, and he proceeded to knock her down and pour the liquor down her throat. She resisted, and a noisy quarrel ensued, during which Mrs. Brown's daughter struck Purcell between the shoulders with an axe and temporarily disabled him. On recovering, Purcell followed Miss Brown and threatened to take her life. In his absence Kesiah escaped to the cellar, and thence to the house of Wm. Jackson, where she took refuge. Purcell, the next morning, visited Brown's, Miss Brown states, to "take her life." He had nothing to say to the charge other than that Brown's was a house of ill-fame. He was sentenced to four months imprisonment with hard labor. Purcell sneered at the sentence, saying it was easily done, whereupon the Magistrate increased it to six months. Purcell then indulged in filthy language, which was partly directed to the Magistrate. He was quickly removed from the court and an order was made that he be summoned on Monday morning for contempt of court. Six months more will probably be added to his term of imprisonment. The case of Alex. Campbell vs. Daniel Munroe was adjourned until Tuesday next.
