## "Brown Bomber" To Start Comeback Campaign Against Jack Sharkey August 18th

NEW YORK, July 20—(AP)—Promoter Mike Jacobs announced today that J. Louis, Detroit negro heavyweight, would start his comeback campaign in a 10-round bout with Jack Sharkey, former world champion, at the Yankee Stadium August 18.

NEW YORK, July 20—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, veteran Boston heavyweight, was selected today as the man to start the comeback campaign against Mike Jacobs' 20th Century Sporting Club signed Sharkey and the Detroit colored lad for a 10-round bout at the Yankee Stadium Aug. 18.

Johnny Buckley, who has managed Sharkey since long before he won and lost the world's heavyweight crown, came down from Boston to sign the contract.

Nothing was said about terms but it is believed each fighter has agreed to a 20 per cent of the net receipts with the milk fund cutting in on

the gate.

Sharkey, now in the midst of what so far has been a successful comeback campaign, was elected the Squire of Chestnut Hill because if he can win from the negro, he will put himself back in the thick of the heavyweight doings and maybe land a chance to win back the title.

Sharkey won the crown by pointing out a close 15-round decision over Schmeling at Long Island on June 21, 1932. He dropped the title to Primo Carners a year later.

His comeback campaign began last November when he knocked out Unknown Winston twice in what was to have been a 10-rounder at Boston.

At a popular \$10 top price, Mike Jacobs believes a Sharkey-Louis fight will outdraw a proposed return fight between the negro and Max Baer. Al Epstein of Chicago also had been considered as an opponent for Louis.

## 8TH BATTERY DEFEAT BAKERS

Coming to bat with two out, two on and one run in, Maitland Owen walloped the third pitch for four bases to send in the two runners ahead of him and give his team a 5 to 1 lead.

The Bakers were far from through however. They pushed across a run in the fifth and then retailed with a four run blast of their own in the sixth to take the lead for the first time. It proved to be shortlived however Kane coming through in the pinch with his deciding and timely blow.

Friday night's scrap was hardly over when the fans were wondering just when Leslie would defend his title again. The big Bouris battler is without a doubt the biggest drawing card to appear on the flat horizon in years and no matter how soon his bouts end the fans appear satisfied and want more of him. Leslie certainly wastes no time in getting into action and no matter who his opponent is George will always make a scrap of it. And after all what fan would not rather see a real honest-to-goodness scrap than a neat boxing exhibition.

**LESLIE CAME OUT** of his scrap with Biggar in fine shape. A badly discolored eye was the only mark he bore Saturday morning and naturally he was all tickled to death of retaining his title. Biggar proved to be a disappointed boy but had no alibis to offer and summed up the fight with the brief statement "the better man won." A title bout for Exhibition Week is now being rumored. The big boys always prove drawing cards and if the elimination contest provides a boxer with an even chance of taking the champion then a new attendance record for Island boxing will likely be forthcoming.

The main event will be between Laurie Spears of Truro and Kid Sparks of Amherst. Both boys are light heavies with reputations of being clever boxers and willing to mix it any time. Spears has important victories under his belt including a decision from Phil Rivers in Toronto and K. O. victories over Jerry White and K. O. Baker. Sparks is known as a two-fisted never-say-die fighter throwing punches all the time. Both fighters are in A-1 shape and ready to give the fans their money's worth. Young Jordan, also of Truro, mixes with Bob Forsythe while Maxie Stone meets the "Fighting Dane," Jack Neilson. These bouts will be the highlight of what promises to be a fine card. In the preliminaries the fighting twins Big Don and Big Bill, 80-pounders, will stage a clever exhibition while Kid Spencer and Kid Judson, 88 and 87 pounds and ten years old, will fight for the paperweight title of the Island.
