## 234 Are Tested In Morell Clinic

"It's just wonderful! Amazing what the Lions Clubs are doing by holding these glaucoma clinics!" were the comments of Mrs. Homer James of Middletown, last night at the Morell Community Hall where the fourth Lions glaucoma clinic was being held.

At a clinic held at St. Peter's last week it was discovered that Mrs. James was a glaucoma victim, and had returned to the Morell clinic last night to consult Dr. William Moreside regarding further treatment for the ailment. "If it had not been for that clinic I might have become blind," she concluded.

Under the care of qualified specialists Doctors J.W. Moreside and J.P. Lanz, a total of 234 persons took the glaucoma test at Morell yesterday afternoon and evening, bringing the total to date to 1,282.

So far 23 cases of non-suspected glaucoma have been found not to mention a large number of borderline cases that will require further inspection

## Construction Has Started On New Bishop's Residence

Construction of a new bishop's residence and chancery offices for the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Charlottetown has been completed on North River Road. The T-shaped building, with a stone exterior, will house living quarters for the Bishop of Charlottetown, and quarters for staff. It will be located on the east side of North River Road on property belonging to St. Vincent's Orphanage, close to the coast development that houses several members of the Charlottetown parish department.

Construction of the new building, considered for some time, was made necessary because of lack of space in the Bishop's Residence adjoining St. Dunstan's Basilica.

H. P. Pielan is the general contractor for the job, and Peter A. McNeill is the architect. The building, scheduled to be completed by Dec. 31, will have two storeys and a basement and will be approximately 100 feet in length in the main section. Excavation work started Monday.
