Basilica Youth Ann. Communion Breakfast Held

The annual Communion Breakfast of the Basilica Youth Club was held Sunday morning in Parkdale Hall and the large gathering of B.Y.C. members heard an inspiring address on the meaning of the Mystical Body of Christ by Mr. John Eldon Green.

The breakfast, presided over by Mr. Ivan Dowling, followed eight o'clock Mass at Saint Dunstan's Basilica which was offered by Rev. Clarence Roche and at which the B.Y.C. members received Holy Communion in a body.

"Are you members prepared to take your position in the Mystical Body of Christ? and what does this mean in the light of eternity?" were the two soul stirring questions posed by Mr. Green as he came to the conclusion of his outstanding address.

The guest speaker asked these questions after he had told his audience that their two main obligations as Mystical Body members were prayer and good example.

He also added that effective action was needed in order for them to play their full role. "There are many fields in our country, Province and City which need the solicitude of laymen of goodwill," he stated.

"You are not expected to undertake great things," he continued, "Each man must find out what he can do and then do it to the best of his ability."

In his opening remarks Mr. Green told his audience that he was a member of the Christian Family Movement and as such had learned a great deal about the meaning of the Mystical Body of Christ.

"St. Paul has stated that Christ is the Head of the Body of the Church," stated the guest speaker. "We as members of the Church are members of the Mystical Body and Christ has need of us to do his work just as the head of the body has need of its other parts."

He pointed out that this body is one unbroken unity and that sins of humanity today increase the sufferings of Christ on Calvary over 1900 years ago. He also pointed out that those in suffering can unite their sufferings to Christ and quoted the soldier-poet Joyce Kilmer as saying, "The weight of the pack on my back reduced the weight of the Cross on Christ's back."

Mr. Green stated that an under-

standing of the Mystical Body created a deeper appreciation for the sacredness of the life and he explained why families should be increased rather than restricted.

Following Mr. Green's address, Rev. Reginald Phelan spoke briefly congratulating the guest speaker and explaining the work and the need for work in the field of Catholic Action. A vote of thanks to the speaker was moved by Mr. Desmond Burge.

Breakfast was served by the members of the Parkdale Women's Institute and a vote of thanks for the splendid meal was move by Mr. Leo Dowling.
