

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

The First Baptist Church, Charlottetown meets every Sunday at 11:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. During the period of Daylight Saving Time the evening service begins at 7:30 p.m. During the week various groups in the Church meet to conduct programs and meetings. Mid-week prayer service is on Wednesday evening at 7:30. There is Sunday School for all ages at 9:45 a.m. The church has a seating capacity of over 200 which can be increased with the overflow to over 600. In the church basement can be found a huge auditorium capable of seating over 300. There is a sound reinforcing system throughout the building. The Church was established in 1943 with the first pastor being Rev. Benjamin Scott. In 1845 the first house of worship was erected on the corner of Upper Prince and Exton Streets. In 1875, a larger church was dedicated on the site of the old church. In 1905 the first session of the Baptist Convention was held in the Octagonal Baptist Church. In the need of further church expansion a new church building was dedicated and opened on May 15, 1959.

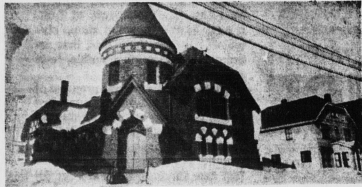

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

Rev. Wm. Black, recognized as the "Apostle of Methodism in the Maritime Provinces," was the first Methodist Minister to visit Charlottetown, arriving in October, 1783. Rev. James Boulton was the first resident Minister and the congregation was formed in 1809. In November 1814 the first church was built and in 1835 a new church on the present site to seat 600 was dedicated. In May, 1887, the corner-stone of the present building was laid by Mrs. Dundas, the Lady of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of Queen Victoria. The Church was known as "The Brick Church", and was opened and dedicated in 1891. In 1910 Hartz Memorial Hall was built and a new parsonage erected on Richmond Street. The need for extension of the work created Park Royal congregation in 1938 and a new church was built in Parkdale. In 1960 and was acquired in Spring Park area and a temporary building erected and the work progressed with a new Manse on Dunkirk Street in 1963 to serve that area. With a view to the future a site adjacent to Clifton Church in Bunsbury was secured by the congregation of Clifton and Mount Herbert in 1963, the two points having become part of Trinity Pastoral Charge in 1962.



CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The history of the congregation dates back to the year 1844 at which time they were under the leadership of Mr. Hughes, but without a building of their own. However, it was not until 1867 that the church was organized and met at that time in a hall. A Church house was soon after erected on Great George St. (present Pentecostal Church on Elm Ave. Central Christian Church was incorporated by Act of Parliament June 9, 1900 and the present church edifice was erected very soon afterwards and dedicated September 22nd, 1900. Mr. R. F. Weston was the first to minister to the congregation. In 1960 the Church purchased the Simms Building which had been used as the naval barracks. This building now houses the Maritime Christian College, as well as being used by the Bible School and various organizations of the Church. The hope and prayer of the present existing body is to maintain the aims and ideals of New Testament Christianity which prompted its founders to establish and to build.

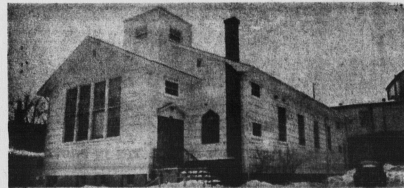
ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL

During a visit of the Bishop of Nova Scotia in 1866, it was decided that either St. Paul's Church should be enlarged or a "Chapel of Ease" erected in the west end of the City, in which the pews should be free. The latter course was decided upon, and a site provided by Mr. William Cundall. The cost of the building was fixed at 900 pounds sterling. Dr. Herbert Binney, then Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, decided that to avoid legal difficulties St. Peter's, as the new Church was named, should be consecrated as the Cathedral of the Province, thus making it "Extra Parochial". The Rev. George Hodgson, his Chaplain, was appointed its first Priest Incumbent in 1868. Divine Service was first held in the Church on June 13th, and the Church was Consecrated on St. Peter's Day, June 29th, 1870, for the Worship of Almighty God, "according to the rites and ceremonies of that branch of the Catholic Church, commonly called the Church of England"; and it was stipulated in the Deed that the Bishop's Chair should be placed in the Church and continually kept therein, "in order and to the intent that the said church may be deemed a Cathedral." Present priest is the Venerable John Davies.



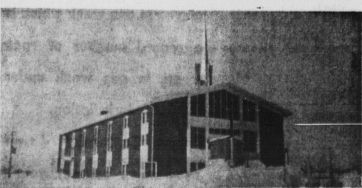
ZION PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The former Free Church on Prince Street and the Queen Square Church on the North side of Richmond Street, (afterwards Zion) were officially organized by the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, in 1860. These two churches, were united to form Zion in 1870. Zion Church grew in members, and in 1874 on one Communion 119 members were added to the roll. The Church shortly became much too small and it was enlarged in 1885 to seat nearly one thousand. The Church continued to increase and in 1906, the present site, then known as Hobbs Corner was purchased. The Corner Stone was laid October 4, 1911, and the present Church was opened and dedicated May 11-13, 1913. An important part of the Church's work through the years has been the Department of Christian Education, with growing numbers of young people and girls and boys. In 1961 the hitherto unused portion of the basement was finished, giving the Sunday School thirteen extra class rooms. In 1962 a New Organ was installed and dedicated. The same year the Lower Assembly Hall and Kitchen were renovated, and the former was dedicated as the Coles Memorial Hall. Present Minister is Rev. Donald A. Campbell.



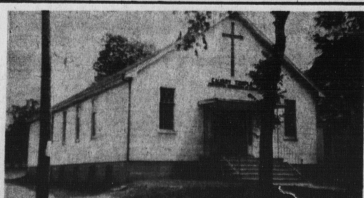
CHARLOTTETOWN BIBLE CHAPEL

In 1954 small groups of Christians began meeting in homes and later on in the Sons of England Hall under the leadership of Mr. Sverre Christensen. The construction of the Charlottetown Bible Chapel began in 1955. The building was opened for services on New Year's Day, 1956. The work has been done voluntarily by the Christians. Mr. Christensen was pastor until 1958. Mr. James A. Stair, B.Sc., Th.M. came to continue the work and is the present pastor. This is the message of the Charlottetown Bible Chapel. We believe and preach the Bible as the verbally inspired word of God. We are told of the necessity of the New Birth in the Bible. Jesus said in John 3:3 "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the Kingdom of God." Through His death on Calvary's Cross, Jesus Christ has made possible our salvation. PARK ROYAL CHURCH

Park Royal Congregation was formed as a separate Pastoral Charge in the year 1957, to serve the spiritual needs of people in the Parkdale, Sherwood and Royalty Communities. These are areas where a high percentage of families move frequently. The Church Sanctuary was dedicated in June of 1958. Temporary hall facilities were built into the basement of the building. A modern home for the minister was constructed in 1959 beside the Church. Both Church and Manse have been possible because of the energetic and willing congregation of men and women who have spent countless hours of volunteer labour in the cause. The present minister, the Rev. J. R. Tye, B.A., B.D., was inducted to the Charge in 1961.



CALVARY TEMPLE

Calvary Temple is located on Upper Prince Street and is affiliated with the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada is an organized body of more than eight hundred churches across Canada with Executive Offices in Toronto, Ontario. Calvary Temple was formerly located on Harley Street in Parkdale and moved to more adequate facilities upon completion of the new edifice on Upper Prince Street approximately five years ago. The present edifice poses a main sanctuary with seating capacity of over two hundred and fifty and a lower auditorium and Sunday School rooms meeting the demands of a growing church. Calvary Temple maintains the Sunday School as a well organized and effective arm of the church in regards to evangelism. Calvary Temple vigorously participates in home and foreign missions with offerings to that chapter amounting to nearly five thousand dollars annually. Calvary Temple is Bible centered in doctrine holding forth the cardinal truths of God's Word. It is evangelistic in approach and missionary minded in outreach. Our motto is, "The whole Bible for the whole community." Our message is Jesus Christ as Saviour of the soul, Healer of the body, Baptizer with the Holy Ghost for power for service and we believe that Christ is coming back again.



THE SALVATION ARMY

The Salvation Army commenced work in Charlottetown in 1886 under the leadership of Captain Doherty. At that time the meetings were held in the old Methodist Church at the corner of Easton and Upper Hillsboro. Several years later the Corps was moved to its present location on Great George Street. We stress evangelistic messages for people from the cradle to the grave. It is anticipated that a new edifice will be erected in the near future. Present Commanding Officer is Major H. H. Walker, ably assisted in the women's field by Mrs. Walker.
