THE STANLEY'S SUCCESS.

"ON STANLEY ON," was the watchword on Wednesday of thousands of our citizens who watched the lively fight that our old and much-maligned S. S. Stanley waged with the ice. According to late issues of the Patriot this good ship has become the source of much merriment, and the Patriot, not content to state facts, has gone out of the way of honorable journalism, and in a recent article has added one hour to the actual time of the passage to Pictou. What have the Captain and Engineers of the Stanley ever done to the Patriot that it should seek to belittle their management of the ship on her first trip this year? The Editor of the Patriot, eager to boom the new boat Minto has, in this instance, displayed but little knowledge of the action of the ice in the Strait. Because the Minto crossed without meeting ice, he is surprised that 2 1/2 hours afterwards the Stanley should have any difficulty, notwithstanding that the wind, which had been blowing west all night and northwest the day before, had by this time hauled strong from the south. Mr. Lord is in daily communication with Capt. Finlayson as to the state of the Gulf, and if everything were plain sailing the Minto could do in three hours what the Stanley took five and a half to accomplish why did not Mr. Lord have the Minto come to Charlottetown when urged by the Board of Trade to do so? Here was an opportunity for the management to stop the adverse criticism of many against their new pet, to break the gulf record with the Minto and give her a chance; but, Mr. Editor, they prefer to make a record for the Minto with their mouths, and by getting certificates from inexperienced passengers instead of risking their pet in a struggle with the ice in our bay.

The Patriot instead of extending a welcome to Capt. Brown and his ship for the feat of opening Charlottetown to navigation, has nothing to offer but sneers. But even Winsloe Road farmers and other mariners will appreciate the struggle the Board of Trade put forth in the interest of trade and navigation, which is the interest of the whole country. Our bay has never been any worse at any time this winter than it was on Wednesday last, and as the Stanley came in then she could have done the same thing months ago. Every unprejudiced mind must be convinced that the Patriot's idol, the Minto, has been outdone by the Stanley's entrance on Wednesday, and this has proved what has been contended all along, that the Minto or Stanley could have come here much later in the fall than they did, or indeed have run to this port all this winter. It also proves that there is nothing wrong with the blooming rose of the Stanley or any other part of her. Whether as much can be said for the Minto will be better known when the bills come in for repairs, and for 15 to 20 casks of fresh water daily (and an evaporator idle on board) and the new valve said to be on the way out from Scotland which will make the third already as the second one is worn out. But this is only the beginning. As the Master of the Administration said in a memorable speech at Ottawa, "We are spending much money; for we are making much money; but wait until you see us next year"—and the blooming rose of the Minto when she goes on the slip for repairs,—and it won't be the last rose of summer either.
