

Eisenhower Sees McCarthy-Army Row Useless

WASHINGTON (AP) President Eisenhower said Wednesday the McCarthy-army row has cost the United States a loss of international prestige and, to some extent, of national self respect. He hopes, he told his press conference, that the incident will provide advantages that are at least comparable to those losses. He took occasion also, in answering questions, to say he knows nothing that would cause him to lose confidence in Army Secretary Robert Stevens' administration of the army. On that basis, the president said, he would back Stevens to the limit. Stevens has been testifying for 10 days before the Senate investigations sub-committee about alleged efforts of chairman Joseph McCarthy and his staff to obtain special treatment for Army Pte. G. David Schine, and McCarthy's countercharge that Schine was held as a "hostage" to hamper his sub-committee's investigation of the army. McCarthy, informed of the president's remarks, declined to comment on the possible loss of national self-respect. On other points, he said: "The hearings were brought on by the charges of Stevens and (army counsel John G.) Adams. I have no choice but to defend my staff. I think the hearings are a great waste of time, but I didn't call them. I can't call them off."

Increase In P.E.I. Butter Production

The large increase in the first three months of this year in the production of butter indicates a corresponding increase in milk production for this Province. For the period this year to the end of March butter production totalled 665,000 pounds compared to 543,000 in the same period of 1953. This represents a 22 per cent rise and the increase is still being maintained at present, according to Department of Agriculture officials. Just for the week ending April 24 the production was 88,240 pounds compared with 63,158 for the comparable week last year. Officials feel that this is all the more remarkable in view of the fact that 1953 saw the greatest butter production in the history of the Province. No figures were available on the production of milk for the Island. However, it was noted that sale of raw milk in this city is no longer permitted having been stopped the first of last month. Henceforth only pasteurized is delivered here. Pasteurization plants, in addition to those operating in Charlottetown, are located at Summerside, Borden and Montague.

100 Unemployed Picket Entrance To Parliament

OTTAWA, (CP)—About 100 men picketed the entrance to the main Parliament Building Wednesday, and lobbied members of the Commons for federal action on unemployment. The delegation—described by leaders as representing unemployed in different sections of Ontario—was unsuccessful in attempts to meet Prime Minister St. Laurent but saw some other members of various parties. One leader had a brief meeting with Labor Minister Gregg, giving him briefs declaring that Canada is in the start of a depression and calling for measures such as expanded trade and more public works to boost available jobs. One member of the delegation said it included some Communists but that largely it consisted of unemployed who got financing for the trip by car by levies on employed workers at the gates of their plants. The delegation represented groups at Sudbury, Toronto, Hamilton, Welland, St. Catharines, Port Colborne and Niagara Falls. For a couple of hours before the Commons convened, they marched about the main door of Parliament's centre block, carrying placards and banners.

RCMP ON HAND
Among the slogans they carried: "Expand the Canadian steel industry," "Save the textile industry," "Build a Canadian St. Lawrence Seaway," "Expand world trade," and "A publicly-owned trans-Canada pipeline." RCMP constables kept an eye on the marchers, but did not interfere with them. The delegation had a meeting with members of the Social Credit party's trade and commerce and labor committees. John Blackmore, member for Lethbridge, said the committees agree with the delegation's points "because they can be done."

McCarthy Appears As Witness, Refuses To Reveal Source Of Information

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Joseph McCarthy took the witness stand Wednesday and, in dramatic sworn testimony, refused to name an army intelligence officer who, he said, gave him secret Federal Bureau of Investigation material warning of Russian spy danger at Ft. Monmouth, N. J. Roaring his refusal at a televised hearing, the Wisconsin senator told army counsel Joseph N. Welch: "Neither you nor anybody else will get me to violate the confidence of loyal people. . . You can try until doomsday." Welch reminded McCarthy of his oath to "tell the whole truth" and implored him to do so. But McCarthy stuck to his position and was upheld by Senator Karl Mundt (Rep. S. D.), acting chairman of the investigating sub-committee. McCarthy's first appearance as witness provided one of the highlights of the 10-day-long airing of his row with high Pentagon officials.

CONDENSED VERSION

It was McCarthy's day in another respect, too. He established, through FBI director, J. Edgar Hoover, that the secret material in question was a condensed version — mostly word-for-word — of a spy warning the FBI sent to army intelligence Jan. 26, 1951. McCarthy's version of this material — in the form of a letter purporting to be from Hoover — as a "per-fover" phoney. Hoover sent word through a sub-committee aide that he never wrote such a letter. But after a check the aide, Robert A. Collier, said Hoover told him the letter was taken almost verbatim from a much longer FBI memo issued on that same 1951 day. Then arose the question of where McCarthy got the letter. When he took the witness chair, he said he waived any senatorial immunity he might have. "I will not under any circumstances reveal the source of any information I may get as chairman of this committee," he told the hearing. McCarthy is the regular chairman of the Senate investigations sub-committee.

CLAIMS ARMY DILATORY

McCarthy produced the letter in an effort to show that the army dragged its feet in rooting out alleged subversives, although he said it had ample warning. Army Secretary Robert Stevens has repeatedly denied he was dilatory — and Wednesday he declared that the army ordered a full FBI investigation of Ft. Monmouth in April, 1953 — two months after he took office. McCarthy said Wednesday the letter with the FBI material was handed to him a year ago by an army officer who was "deeply disturbed" that despite repeated FBI warnings "nothing was being done" about Communist infiltration of places like the top secret radar laboratory at Ft. Monmouth. Disclosure of such FBI information is forbidden by directives issued by former president Truman and kept in force by the Eisenhower administration. But McCarthy said, speaking of the young intelligence officer: "He felt that his duty to his country was above any duty to any Truman directive. . ."

To Hold Board Plebiscite In May

A decision by the Provincial Marketing Board at a meeting yesterday to hold the balloting on the plebiscite on "A scheme for marketing potatoes" during the week of May 24 was announced. At the same time officials expressed the hope that counting of the ballots could be completed during the first week in June. Although the number of ballots to be cast cannot be ascertained now the Board will send 7,000 by mail to the licensed growers. Named as returning officer was Sheriff John L. Beaton, the scrutineers appointed are Messrs. Gordon MacMillan, Cornwall, William Thompson and S. C. Wright, Charlottetown.
