NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

OTTAWA, Dec. 27.
The more the present scheme of building
the Canada Pacific Railway is thought
over, the more it commends itself to the
thinking public of Ontario and Quebec.

The Government supporters, excepting
two or three speculators in Manitoba lands,
will vote squarely for the scheme. They
invite discussion. The Hamilton members
asked Mr. Blake to allow Sir Charles Tupper
to speak at Blake's meeting in Hamil-
ton. Mr. Blake refused.

Sir Charles Tupper will hold meetings at
Hamilton and Montreal.

Haythorne's letter, in the Patriot, has
been received here. By Island members
and Senators it is considered weak, one-
sided and untruthful. A reply is to be
published in the Island papers.

The opinion of Island Members and
Senators is that Haythorne acts an unman-
part in trying to shirk his responsibility in
what he calls "entraping the Island into
Confederation, and selling the independent
constitution enjoyed for a hundred years."
He himself, it is remarked, was willing to
entrap the Island for twenty-eight thousand
dollars a year less than the "better terms,"
and it is well known that he pledged him-
self to stop building the Island road, and
built seventy miles more at a higher cost.
While he failed to provide for the extra
obligation he incurred, he did not fail to
provide for Robert Poore Haythorn. He
concealed the fact that he was going to
Ottawa to make terms, and started off at
midnight without the knowledge of the
people at large.

Mr. Haythorne supported Mr. Macken-
zie's Act, which offered any company for
building twenty-six hundred miles, ten
thousand dollars in cash and twenty thou-
sand acres per mile and a guarantee of
four per cent on the sum expended over that
total, including interest at Haythorne's
valuation for land—one hundred and forty
millions. The present agreement, taking
the same valuation, will involve a total
cost of one hundred and three millions, or
Tupper's valuation of land—seventy-eight
millions.

The Island members say the country
that is going to derive the benefit from the
Road should pay for it out of lands and
proceeds of lands, and not burden P. E.
Island tax-payers to pay for a share of the
road.

The Syndicate states that steel rails and
iron bridges will be used, and that they
always understood the Union Pacific of 1873
to be the standard. There is a small petiti-
on from a few of Cartwright's friends against
the agreement.

The Opposition manifesto is ridiculed,
and Grits here are ashamed of it.

No Opposition policy is yet announced,
but to make tax-payers in Old Provinces
pay for the road.

It is said that Howlan will speak in favor
of the present terms. He thinks the bargain
good.

The Senators on both sides think Hay-
thorne's manoeuvre more like that of a political
agent than becoming to a dignified
Senator.

And any further
deficiency which may arise from insuffi-
cient quality of land among the said portion of
railway to complete the said twenty-five mil-
lion acres, or from the prevalence of lakes and
water stretches in the sections granted, which
lakes and water stretches shall not be com-
puted in the acreage of such sections, shall be
made up from other portions to be selected
by the company in the tract known as the
"fertile belt," that is to say, the land lying
between parallels 49 and 57 de-
grees of north latitude, or elsewhere, at
the option of the company, by the grant
therein of similar alternate sections extending
back twenty four miles deep on each side of any
branch line or lines of railway to be located by
the company, and to be shown on a map or plan
thereof deposited with the Minister of Railways,
or of any common front line or lines agreed upon
between the Government and the company—the
conditions hereinbefore stated as to lands not
fairly fit for settlement to be applicable to such
additional grants.
