Thousands Are Expected For Big Lobster Carnival

Summerside is ready and waiting to assume a carnival appearance this week and to play hosts to thousands of Islanders and visitors for four days at the third annual Lobster Carnival which gets underway Wednesday.

Of course, in any such celebrations, a lot depends on the weather, but closely connected with the big event gives out with an optimistic long-range, fine weather forecast and everyone else shares their optimism in hoping their wishes come true for the best carnival yet.

Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock sees the initial event of this year's show get underway as a monster parade under marshal Ben Champion winds its way through Summerside streets headed by bands from H.M.C.S. Shearwater, R.C.A.F. Station Summerside and Sea Cadet band from Summerside. Besides the many floats and colorful exhibits in the parade, there will be two army "Ducks" which will be a new sight to most people. These two amphibious craft will be in Summerside for the duration of the carnival taking people for rides in the water and on the land in the Summerside area.

After the lobster feasting is over on Wednesday and supper is held from 4:00 until 8:00, the official opening ceremonies will begin with short addresses by general chairman Edgar Cannon, Mayor W.A. Currie who will welcome everyone to the carnival, Hon. A.W. Matheson, Premier, His Honor, F. Walter Hyndman, Lieutenant Governor who will officially open the carnival and Dr. O.H. Phillips, M.P. for Prince who will introduce the Lieutenant Governor.

Harness racing at Summerside raceway follows the official opening at 8:15 under the auspices of the Summerside Fire Department.

A full program for each day has been drawn up and with hundreds more inquiries this year than ever before from American and Canadian visitors, this third annual Lobster Carnival is expected to top the last two by far.
