CLOUD AND RAIN

Haymakers have their troubles compounded this year with a half crop, a late season and recently almost two weeks of bad weather which has impaired the quality of much of the standing hay and almost ruined much that was lying in the fields. On the other side of the coin is the improvement that the rainfall will make in fall pastures and this is important in conserving the meagre supply of forage for winter feeding. The grain is at the moment a very promising crop and reserves of moisture should be ample to fill it satisfactorily. Heavier oat fields are already lodging in patches, a condition which is usually not corrected in a green crop. Potato fields have never shown a more profuse bloom and many of them rival in beauty the best flower gardens. Moisture should now be ample to insure a good crop.

POTATO GRADING

The remarks of Mr. Paul Clements on central grading of Island potatoes will be received with considerable interest by both producer and consumer. Certainly the potato producer, if he is to stay in business, has no alternative but to supply his product in the manner and form required. Quite recently in conversation with a consumer of Island potatoes in Central Canada it was pointed out to us that the housewife was looking for today a sample of potatoes in a five pound bag that was uniform in size.

There may be some variation in the size required by the housewife but certainly very few of them want a sample that contains potatoes ranging in size from 3 ounces to 10 ounces. Certainly while the grading system as presently in force results in a much better product than was the case years ago nevertheless it is not a guarantee of uniform size and quality at the same level. Improvements can only be brought about if the grower understands the problem involved and shows a willingness to accept the changes which are necessary if the potato is to retain its share of the vegetable market.

PRICE SUPPORT

At the recent meeting of the C.F.A. in Port Arthur the decision was reached to appoint a committee consisting of Dr. Hanam and three representatives from the West and an equal number from the East whose function would be to study applications for price support and efficiency payments as they may come forward. It was felt that such a committee was necessary if the C.F.A. was to be properly advised on the position of any particular product and thus be in a position to make well-reasoned recommendations to the proper authorities.

BUTTER INCOME

Butter is an important source of summer farm income in this province and it is disturbing to note that towards the end of July production had fallen as compared with last year by 40,000 pounds per week. In terms of dollars and cents this means that on the average each of some 6,000 butter producers had approximately \$4.00 per week less income and that in the face of costs which are certainly not declining. Present prospects are for pastures better than that of a year ago, hold its own but should pastures fail not many farmers will be inclined to use the feed which will be sorely needed during the coming winter. Certainly the scarcity of hay is going to have its effect on both milk and beef production during the coming winter.

BIG WEEK

For next week the Island offers one of its major attractions for both visitors and natives - Old Home Week with its horse racing, livestock exhibits, handicraft display and the midway with a thousand wonders. In point of number of people involved, the Exhibition stands in a class by itself. There is something for old and young, something for the quiet and the eager, and something for the quick and the slow. The management has a great deal at stake and will be hoping for fine weather which if it materialize will place a good many haymakers on the horns of a dilemma.

Awarded \$600 Scholarship

Miss Miriam Hyde of Cornwall has been awarded a \$600 scholarship and a trip to the Canadian National Exhibition with all expenses paid.

The scholarship can be used any time within the next five years to help pay for a course in Home Economics, or at any school leading to a degree in agriculture.

The C.N.E. awards annually ten scholarships. One goes to each province and the person to receive the award is selected by the Department of Agriculture in the province concerned. Candidates for the scholarships may be a boy or girl at least 17 years old on the 1st of July of the year in which the application is made and with at least two years experience in 4-H Club work.

The successful candidate may use the scholarship money for a course in Home Economics, at a recognized college of agriculture in a course leading to a degree in agriculture or in veterinary science, or at a course in a school of agriculture leading to a diploma.

Miss Hyde was born in Meadowbank where she resides with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hyde.

She has completed Grade XII along with a teacher training course at Prince of Wales College. She is planning to teach school for the next year and will then continue her training in Home Economics.

In 4-H Club work she has completed four years as a member of the Meadowbank Sewing Club and has also been a member of the Meadowbank Garden Club for three years.

In 1955 Miss Hyde was a member of the Garden Club team that represented this Province at the National 4-H Club week in Toronto. She also represented her sewing club at the Rural Youth Program held in connection with the
