He has used both these instruments before me with a flame, and in both, when set on fire, the flame was arrested by the wire gauze, and extinguished, and the instruments are faithfully constructed, and carefully attended to, so that the wire gauze does not suffer in any manner from heat or vibration, and is so fitted to that the protection will prove effectual against explosion. Nothing short of this conviction would induce me to give my opinion. I have used both the burning flasks, so called, as I have thought they ought to be entirely discarded, if not prohibited from use in any circumstances, and if not on the ground of ignorance and carelessness. In every case, glass lamps should be given up; and those of metal substituted, and fitted with a proper wire gauze.
