Canada Aims To Be First With Pipeline For Solids

EDMONTON (CP) — Canada is working to become the first country in the world to build a pipeline to carry solid material in capsule form. Most of the research is being done in Alberta.

ample," says Dr. Hodgson. "It comes out of the pipeline an awful mess." The other is to generate enough pumping pressure through the line to keep the particles in suspension, and thus moving freely.

Dr. Hodgson believes pipeline capsule transportation would be more economical than building rail lines to inaccessible minerals.

Proponents say the project could bring development of wilderness areas such as the Canadian north where lack of transport has hindered or stopped the exploitation of rich mineral deposits.

Much depends on whether the federal and provincial governments, and an industrial syndicate of 25 companies will provide money for a proposed \$5,000,000 pilot plant for full-scale testing of the scheme.

Dr. G. W. Hodgson, head of the council's petroleum division, has been directing the project since he and Dr. M. E. Charles, now professor of chemical engineering at the University of Toronto, accidentally discovered that viscous oil in a pipeline formed into globules and flowed freely when a water lubricant was sent through the line with it.

Cost of shipping solids by pipeline has been estimated at about half a cent a ton mile. Oil and gas cost about two-tenths of a cent a ton mile for shipping in a pipeline. Rail freight rates, Dr. Hodgson says, work out to more than a cent a ton mile.
