THE market to-day was well attended. Prices as follows: Beef (small) from 6 to 12 cts. per lb.; Beef (qr.) from 5 to 8 cents per lb.; mutton, from 7 to 10 cents per lb.; lamb (qr.) from 60 cts to \$1; veal from 3 to 8 cts. per lb.; pork (small) from 7 to 10 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cts.; turkeys, from \$1.00 to \$2.00; geese (wild), from 50 to 75 cents each; fowls, from 25 to 30 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 20 to 22 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 18 to 26 cents per lb.; ducks 20 to 25 cents per pair; eggs from 10 to 12 cents per doz.; potatoes from 15 to 20 cents per bushel; flour, from \$3 to \$3.25; hay, from 60 to 65 cents per 100 lbs.; oats, from 40 to 45 cents. per bushel; Oatmeal, from \$3 to \$3.25; timothy seed per bushel, from \$3.75 to \$5.00; clover seed, per lb., from 25 to 28 cents.

THE "WORCESTER."—We omitted mentioning on arrival of the "Worcester" that she had been largely repaired and improved since her departure from here last fall. Sheathed and coppered anew, and generally renovated, she is now, we learn, a better sea boat than she has been for years. Her cabins are well arranged and beautifully painted, and contain all the conveniences which make passengers comfortable. The "Worcester" is still commanded by Captain Heide, who has an established reputation for good seamanship, and who is, on all occasions, uniting in his efforts to provide for the pleasure and convenience of passengers. We might here state that he is ably assisted in the latter duty by our genial friend, Mr. Frederick Sawyer, purser. The "Worcester's" cargo for Boston, yesterday, consisted of: 176 boxes of eggs, 1 cask calfskins, 2 cases hides, 14 bales canvas, 37 do. rope, 15 packages junk, 185 empty kerosene barrels.

H. M. S. PINAFORE.—This saucy little craft will anchor at Charlottetown this evening, and should be the means of drawing our play-goers—"their sisters and their cousins and their aunts." We believe it is the intention to play the opera only this evening and to-morrow, Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock—consequently there is but little chance available for those who would learn what this eternal whistling of Pinafore and curious sayings, such as "what, never" etc., means. The Box Plan is filling rapidly, and we are glad to see it. We clip the following brief notice from a Yarmouth, N. S., exchange:—"When we were daily informed that H. M. S. Pinafore was about here, we felt a genuine desire to see it, and having done so, would it be high treason to say we feel a desire to see it again. The charm of Pinafore seems to be that it does not wear out on its first view. One finds hidden sarcasm and new vocal beauties on every visit. The Lindley Company are excellent in their interpretation of this eccentric production. If we would choose one individual, par excellence, we should say Dick Deadeye, as presented by Tavernier, is the man, although the others came up to the ideal. Lindley himself, although the grotesque occasionally pops out, is a power in the east, and his Admiral is well acted and sang throughout. Mr. Bird's Captain, whatever it may lack vocally, is amply made up for in the acting, and he scored a hit. Miss Helen Adell looks graceful and pleasing enough to charm the whole crew, let alone the Admiral. Milla, Nault is the most operatic artist in the cast, and her rendition of her *marcotte* is perfection. Last, but not least, comes Miss Louise Forster, who seems created for Hebe, as her figure, pose and vocalism suit admirably the part." Mr. S. N. Earle will act as musical director.

CABUL, May 6.

The Governor of Ghuznee has advised the inhabitants of Logar Valley to be friendly with the British. Mahomed Jan hopes that as the British evacuated Ghuznee they will retire also from Logar.

Turkistan merchants report that Province quiet, except soldiers demanding arrears of pay.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6.

Lord Granville took the initiative to effect a direct understanding on Montenegrin affairs between the Powers, the result of which has been a note of the Ambassadors at Constantinople to the Porte asking for a categorical statement of its intentions.

BERLIN, May 6.

A petition has been sent to Bundesvahl from Hamburg, signed by 57,000 citizens, praying that the German Empire will not encroach upon their rights. It is stated that Bavaria intends to espouse their cause.

BERLIN, May 5.

Bismarck gave a parliamentary speech yesterday, at which 2,000 were present.

OTTAWA, May 6.

The House will meet at 11 to-morrow, and will be prorogued at 3 p. m. Blake and McKenzie have both left. Many of the other members have also left.
