

Two Veteran Rifle Men Cop Wits At Annual Meet Here

Two veteran riflemen of the P.E.I. Rifle Association, who started shooting way back in 1910, captured the silverware in two of the three matches fired at Squaw Point range Thursday.

Sgt. Percy Landrigan of Charlottetown, registered 102 out of a possible 105 to take the top honors in the Macdonald Tobacco match fired at 200, 500 and 600 yards. The Rogers Hardware Company went at 600 yards was won by Capt. A. J. McCabe, Charlottetown, with 48 out of 50. To take the top spot the captain was forced into a shoot-off with Lt. A. K. Mutch and Sgt. Roy Coles.

In the Macdonald competition SSM Danny Clark of Winsloe scoring 99 out of 105, captured the newly-donated Mary MacLennan award. This was given to the association for the first time this year by the Macdonald Tobacco Co., in honor of the Alexandra schoolteacher, to be awarded to the tyro standing highest in the match sponsored by the company.

The first event of the day, the City of Charlottetown at 300 yards was won in a shoot-off by Lt. Ralph Kennedy with 49 out of 50. He battled it out with Gar. C. C. Strong, Pte. J. A. Marshall, Mrs. Irene Rogers and Sgt. A. W. Seaman.

With the totalling up of the day's aggregate, Lt. A. K. Mutch of Charlottetown and Pte. J. A. Marshall of Picout ended up with 194 of a possible 205. These two marksmen will meet this after-

noon at the 600 yard firing point to shoot it out for the Village Rendezvous prize.

Overshadowing all the match winners and veteran marksmen is the achievement of a diminutive teen-aged girl from York, Lorna Vessey, the daughter of Raymond Vessey. This little lass, who before the prize meet, had only three Saturday afternoon practices with the .303 rifle, in Friday's matches ended up with an aggregate of 191, just three points behind the leaders.

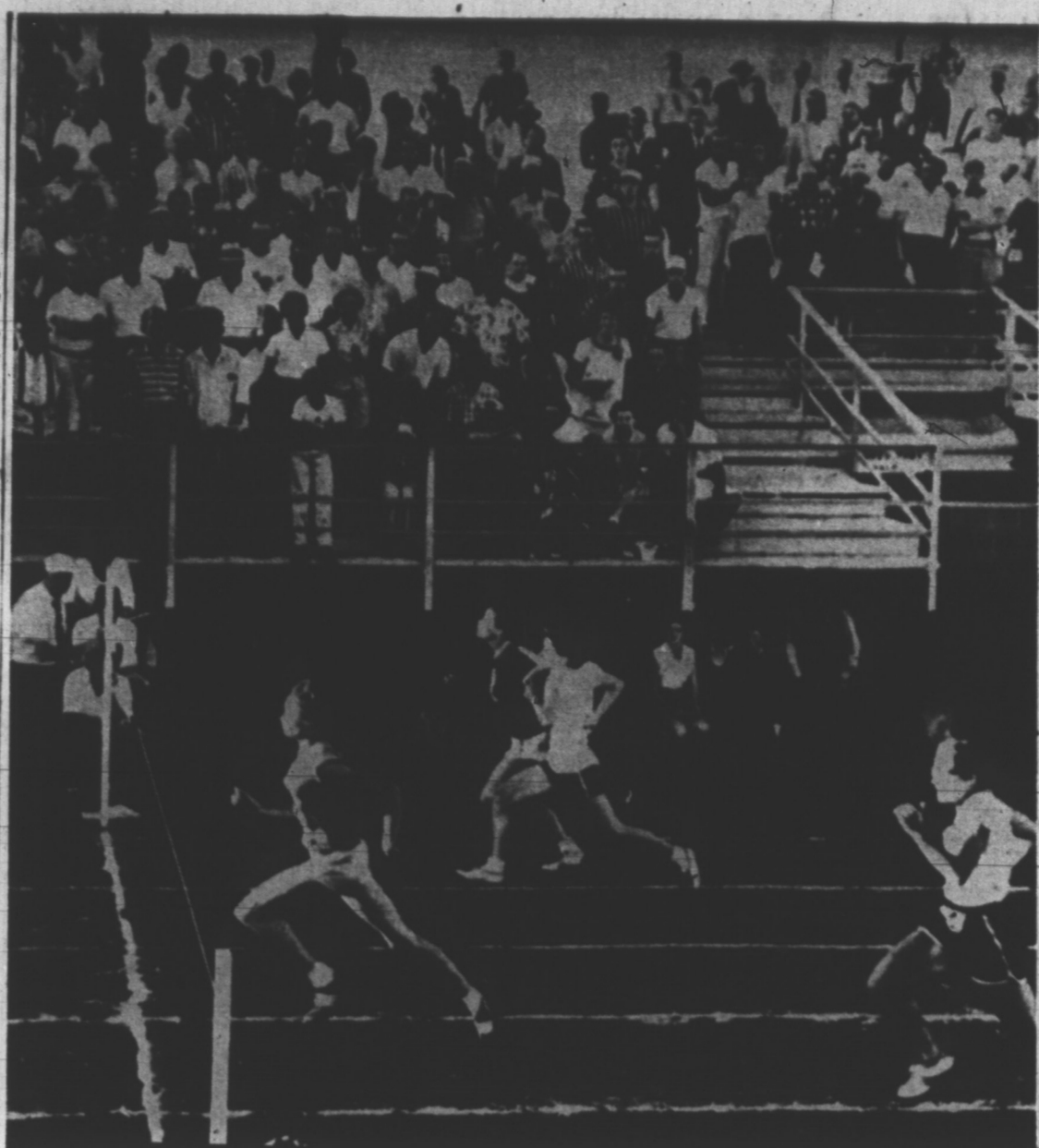

THE CITY SOFTBALL LEAGUE'S regular schedule will come to an end Monday at Victoria Park. However, activity in the loop will go on until August 3 to clear up some postponed tussles and then the players and fans will be looking ahead to the playoffs.

This year's league has been something of a strange one. Rollaway Aces led the field, most of the way while the Lions and Juniors had lots of fun for a time passing second place between them. BIS Shamrocks, the league's defending champions, followed obediently in fourth while the Dodgers have never for a minute been able to get out of the cellar.

Irv MacKinnon's Aces have shown notable balance throughout the season. They have two fine pitchers in Ralph Pineau and in lefthander Wilf Shepherd, an infield that is as good as any in the league, an outfield to match and plenty of power at the plate.

THE LIONS on the other hand, while they have been getting great mileage out of veteran pitcher Art Ballen and some good games by Vince Bradley and Teet Gregory, have been relying on paralyzing power at the plate to win many of their games. In Sammy Gregory, Jack Kane, Forbes Kennedy, Buck Whitlock, and Dave MacLeod, Barry's boys have a lineup that has caused many a pitcher to shudder.

Inconsistency has been the trademark of the Basissica Youth Club entry this season. The Juniors can look tremendous one night and seem to be the worst team in the league the next night. Both their hitting and fielding have been spotty all year long and pitching also has been something of a problem, although Danny MacCormack is coaching what is probably the best hurler in the loop in strong-armed John Hughes.

HUGHES had a sore arm for a while mid-way through the term, but he has gotten over that. When Hughes is at his best - and it seems he almost always is - he can beat any team in the league. He has already hurled several shutouts and his strikeout performances have been eye-opening. The Juniors, with Hughes on the mound, will be awfully hard to beat in the playoffs.

THE BIS SHAMROCKS, without consistent pitching, have been in fourth place and have been playing as a fourth-place entry. However, the Shamrocks can look back to last year when they weren't as well off and they went on to surprise everybody in sight by walking off with the Island championship after ousting BYC Juniors in the semi-finals and polishing off the Lions in fine style in the finals.

The Irish were held back this year also by an injury to star pitcher Joe Thistle, the man most responsible for last year's team being a pennant winner. Thistle was on the sidelines for quite a while on account of the injury and if he is back in top form by the playoffs the Shamrocks will be conceding nothing to the other squads.

THE CELLAR-DWELLING DODGERS lost 16 in a row before being able to win one and then surprised softball followers by also trimming the Aces for their second victory. However, the Dodgers waited far too long to get rolling. While we have not heard anything definite on the number of teams to be in the playoffs we presume they will be the top four and the Dodgers will be watching proceedings from the stands.

The five teams have been dishing up a pretty fair brand of ball for their large following of local fans all season. It is a sure bet that the playoffs will be closely fought. Considering the short series we wouldn't want to make a prediction as to the outcome. Any one of the four could come home a winner.

MILWAUKEE BRAVES got out of their slump Wednesday but nosed back into it Thursday. The Braves had lost seven straight up until Wednesday when Bobby Avila's ninth-inning homer gave them a 5-4 victory over the Reds but yesterday they slipped back losing to Cincinnati 6-2.

The Braves also lost the services of Ed Mathews who will be out indefinitely with a severe bruise on the thigh muscle. Mathews, who leads the NL with 29 homers and has a .304 batting average suffered the injury when he crashed into box seats in an attempt to grab a fly ball.

Needless to say Mathews' loss will not do the Braves any good. Now leading the fourth-place Pirates by a hair the Braves need every victory they can muster to stay ahead of the fast stepping Blues.

Dainty Dianne had a strange start in the racing game. The mare was 12 years old before making her first start on clay tracks this year. In her first outing she was a winner and won again the second time out lowering her individual record to near 2:12. Already, in the third start of her career, she is competing with some excellent horses.

Alonzo Johnson Defeats Pastrano

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Alonzo Johnson, the former barber from Braddock, Pa., scored a unanimous decision over Willie Pastrano in their ten-round televised bout Friday night at Freedom Hall.

The heavy-fisted boxer had his smaller opponent from Miami in trouble from the opening round when he began working on Pastrano's body.

A pair of punishing rights and lefts early in the seventh round staggered Pastrano but he did not go down.

Australia Takes 2-0 Lead In Davis Cup Semi-Finals

MONTREAL (CP) — Australia took a 2-0 lead in the American zone Davis Cup semi-finals Friday, when youngsters Roy Emerson and Rod Laver beat Canada's top twofold stars.

Laver, in the day's most difficult match, played brilliantly to down Canadian champion Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., 6-2, 6-3, 6-4.
