

Edmonton Coach Predicts Alouettes Will Be Tough

VICTORIA (CP)—Montreal Alouettes says Eagle Keys, are going to be tougher to beat in this year's Grey Cup game than they were last year.

As the man who played a heroic role in Edmonton Eskimos' 26-25 win over the Alouettes last year, and as assistant coach of this year's Eskimos, Keys is in a good position to know.

He was the man coach Frank (Pop) Ivy named to scout the Montreal-Toronto Big Four final last Saturday.

Keys returned with the verdict that Alouettes are "stronger in every department."

"We're going to have to try and contain their ground attack and keep rushing (Sam) Etcheberry off balance to win Saturday," he said in an interview Tuesday.

PICKS "MOST DANGEROUS"

Fullback Pat Abbruzzi and halfback J. C. Caroline were singled out as Alouettes' most dangerous players by eastern teams this season, Keys said. A big factor was the runners and Hal Patterson as the pick of the ends.

Russian Hockey Team Arrives In London

LONDON (AP)—Russia's ice hockey team arrived in London Wednesday for three matches against crack British professional teams. It's part of the Russians' preparation for the winter Olympics in Cortina, Italy, in January.

The Russians immediately asked that their matches be handled by neutral referees. It is likely a Swedish referee and another from Switzerland will be in charge of the games.

The Russians brought two completely new sets of equipment and 100 hockey sticks. Their first game is against the Harringay Racers on Saturday. There is a return game against Harrow Monday and the Russians wind up their tour against the Wembley Lions on Thursday.

The Russians were world champions in 1954 and runners-up to Canada in 1955.

TORONTO (CP)—Five Toronto performers leave for Korea Dec. 12 to entertain Canadian and United Nations troops in the Asian theatre. Sheila Billings, Miss Toronto of 1955, is included in the group, which will make a month-long tour. About 100 Canadian soldiers remain in Korea. Other party members are: Dave Broadfoot, television comedian; Sherry Moore dancer; Sheila and Dick Kimberley, a husband and wife team.

James Signs Pro Hockey Contract

TORONTO (CP)—Gerry James one of Canada's outstanding football players, Tuesday night signed a professional contract with Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League. The signing meant the end of a great football career.

The 21-year-old forward agreed to terms with Leafs' general manager Hap Day. He will practice with the Leafs today.

"He's a big-leaguer," Day said of the hard-hitting, 180-pounder. "It's quite a feat for the Leafs to get him."

James arrived in Toronto Tuesday after another tremendous season as a halfback with Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Western Interprovincial Football Union. Bombers were eliminated last week by Edmonton Eskimos in the WIFU finals.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens reported Wednesday that right-winger Boom Geoffrion, out of action for the second time this season with a shoulder injury, expects to be back on the ice Saturday night.

Geoffrion was injured for the second time last Sunday night while Canadiens played New York Rangers, in a check by Lou Fontaine.

Parker Pities Poor Pugs Grappling With Giants

TORONTO (CP)—Pity the poor boxer fighting giants across the sea, says James J. Parker.

The 225-pound Canadian heavyweight from Barrie, Ont., summed up Tuesday his impression of his Nov. 15 battle in London against the 325-pound South African, Ewart (Pottie) Potgieter: "Boy, is Potgieter big!"

The fight between the six-foot-three Canadian and the seven-foot-two South African resulted in a draw.

Parker, in Toronto to train for a possible bout, said: "I'd love to fight Pottie again but preferably over here. It can get awful lonely looking at the top of a guy's chest all evening in a strange country."

Now a resident of Patterson, N. J., Parker said he will stay 10 days in Toronto and that he hopes promoter Frank Tunney will line up an opponent in that time.

"I hear there's talk about Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson (of New York)," said Parker. "He'd be fine. Or if they can get (former heavyweight champion) Ezzard Charles, he would do."

Parker said he is interested in an elimination tournament for the Canadian heavyweight title. Former champion Earl Walls of Edmonton retired after a 12-round draw with Parker in Toronto last March.

Potgieter, on the basis of his showing against Parker, has been sent home to South Africa. Plans for Potgieter to invade the U.S. have been cancelled, temporarily at least.

Scott Frost Is Favorite Today

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Sol Camp's Scott Frost rules a solid favorite to capture the third and deciding leg of the \$75,000 American Trotting Classic at Hollywood Park today.

The 1955 Hambletonian champion has a second and a first in the classic's series. But Scott Frost, trained and driven by Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P.E.I., drew the worst position in the 10-horse field, No. 8.

That puts him far on the outside but under conditions of the race, all Scott Frost has to do is finish fourth or better to nail down the top money.

Jacques Plante Still Tops N.H.L. Goaltenders

NEW YORK (CP)—The goaltender's bugaboo, an off-night, cut two of Jacques Plante's National Hockey League rivals down to size last week, but the Montreal Canadian netminder continued to act as if he's never heard of the word.

The closest thing to it for Plante was the night nearly three weeks ago when Chicago Black Hawks beat him four times in 26 tries for a 4-1 victory. The Canadiens, incidentally, haven't lost in 11 subsequent starts, and it was the only time this season that anyone beat Jacques more than three times in an evening all season. Every other NHL goalie has watched six go by him on at least one occasion.

By contrast, four goals was the total Montreal's opposition managed to shove past Plante in the "Canadians" three games last week. Meanwhile Plante stopped another 53 drives during the week for a .930 average on the 57 first attempts, giving him an over-all mark of .940 for the year.

SAWCHUK TRIPS

The off-night caught up with Terry Sawchuk of Boston last Friday. Previously trailing Plante by only two points, the Bruins goalie fanned on six of 37 shots fired by Chicago Black Hawks and finished the week with a .932 mark, down eight points from the previous week's total.

Retribution caught up with New York's Worsley 24 hours later as he let in six Montreal shots out of 32 for his poorest night of the year. Previously within striking distance of the leaders, he dropped to .531, a point behind Sawchuk and five points off his mark a week ago.

The best performance of the week was turned in by the NHL's busiest goaltender, Chicago's Al Rollins, who blocked 111 shots out of 117 for a .949 mark for the week and a .925 average on the year.

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
