CANADIAN HIGHLANDERS READY.—According to a Kingston, Ont., despatch Rev. John Mackie, M. A., of St. Andrew's Church, says a hundred Highlanders are ready in Canada to step into the place of every man killed in South Africa, and he himself, as their chaplain, could not be left behind. Said he: "Colonels, majors, captains, are numerous amongst us; it is for them now to show whether their training has been for naught, and to volunteer for active service before Parliament has to summon them to the front."

THE SECOND CONTINGENT.—The Council of the Toronto Board of Trade has passed a resolution approving of the second contingent and calling upon the government to call a session of parliament forthwith to provide money for the mobilization and equipment in Canada of a still larger force of volunteers to do garrison duty in place of British regular troops, or "perform such service as may be found most useful during the present crisis, thereby giving expression to Canada's resolution to do her share in maintaining the national position."

AFTER THE FIRE.—A little over a year ago the business portion of the city of New Westminster was wiped out by fire, the loss in property and goods being over \$2,500,000. But a trifle like that could not daunt western enterprise. The annual report of the Board of Trade shows that the city is rapidly recovering from the blow, and is as full of lively optimism as ever. The business blocks are springing up, and the buildings are much superior to the old ones. The population has also increased 400 in the past year.
