## Fisheries Officials Visit At Georgetown

MONTAGUE — Department of fisheries officials and inspection officers for P.E.I. made a special visit to Georgetown Wednesday afternoon and were taken on a tour of Bathurst Marine Ltd., where they were able to see one of the large draggers being built.

The tour to the shipbuilding area was conducted by Tom J. Sanderson of the management staff, Bathurst Marine.

Following the visit they moved to Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., where they were taken on tour by the manager of the plant Einar Munch-Ellingsen.

In the department of fisheries group were R.J. McNeill, assistant chief inspection officer, Halifax, N.S., who following the tour said he was surprised at the progress made in the erection of these plants.

He also pointed out that the method to be used in landing fish at this plant was unique in that the fish were transported by a pallet in large aluminum boxes which would shorten handling time. This method

is not used elsewhere in the Maritimes.

He said the Georgetown plant would be able to handle 40 million lbs. of ground fish, most of which would go to the export market. This will revitalize the ground fish business in Prince Edward Island and will no doubt add greatly to the economy of the Georgetown area.

He also advised this plant will have all the modern, up-to-date equipment and will comply with all fisheries regulations.

## Economist Outlines Goals Projected By ECC Review

An economist with the Canadian International Paper Company, G.C. Gibb of Montreal, said here last night that the present decade can be the "roaring sixties" if the potentials forecast by the Economic Council of Canada in their recently published review can be achieved.

Speaking at the quarterly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade, Mr. Gibb dwelt on these potentials in his address entitled "An economic background to the next five years."

The statement from the council's first annual review which had gained the most publicity, Mr. Gibb said, was the one which stated that this country will have to create 1.5 million new jobs between 1963 and 1970. This would represent an annual growth of nearly 215,000 in the number employed.

He added that this seems a formidable task considering that in the 17-year period, 1946-1963, additions averaged about 100,000, or less than half the required performance in the future.

"The problem appears even more onerous in the light of the accelerating movement to auto-

matized processes," commented the guest speaker.

The council also estimates that output per worker can and should increase by 2.4 per cent a year during the same seven-year period.

The significant factor of these targets, Mr. Gibb said, is that they suggest rates of growth in advance of anything the Canadian economy has ever accomplished in peacetime. He pointed out that the council has gone to great pains to point out that its projections are potentials which should be sought, not predictions of what will happen.

The speaker mentioned that consumer incomes are at high levels and are being spent. He also stated that retail sales in Canada rose by over six per cent last year and have remained high during the three months just ended.

Incidentally, Mr. Gibb said,

"sales in Prince Edward Island did very well in 1964, advancing by 8.2 per cent over 1963, a considerably larger increase than that realized in the country as a whole."

Mr. Gibb was introduced to the meeting by Claude Ives, vice-president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce for P.E.I. and a member of the local Board of Trade. He was thanked by R. T. Henthorn.

The Souris, Kensington, Montague, Crapaud and Charlottetown boards were represented at the meeting. Councillor Grant Mollison represented the town in the absence of Mayor W. E. Jenkins.

W. R. Brennan of the Charlottetown board, told the meeting that a revision of the Eastern Provincial Airways schedule to and from P.E.I. as proposed by the city board, had been taken under definite advisement by the airline. He said, however, that a letter received from EPA yesterday had stated that the recent loss of a Dart-Herald in a crash had upset the airline's plans and the present schedule would have to continue for now.

Other matters discussed at the meeting was harbor improvement, highway safety, highway weight restrictions, all

weather highway, harbor dredging and a proposed small business course.

Bernard St. Clair McCabe, who was recently elected board secretary replacing Alexander Campbell, read the minutes of the last meeting.

## One-Year Jail Term Given On Each Of Three Charges

GEORGETOWN — Leonard Joseph Campbell, Annadale, was sentenced to one year in the Kings County Jail on each of three counts of break, entry, and theft at the Cardigan Liquor Store, John Francis Store, Fortune, and the store of Eldon MacKenzie, Rollo Bay, when he appeared before Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC yesterday.

The accused was also ordered to enter into a recognizance for two years in the amount of \$500 and this recognizance to keep the peace is to be taken two weeks before the expiration of his sentence.

A further condition of the recognizance was that within two months from the date of the bond, the accused must make restitution to the provincial government to the amount of \$55; Eldon MacKenzie, \$30; and John Francis \$30. The three one-year sentences are to run concurrently due to the record of the accused.

Campbell was represented by J. P. Nicholson and crown prosecutor was Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur MacGuigan, QC.

SIX-MONTH TERM  
Thomas William Roy Metcalfe, Annadale, charged with break, entry and theft at the Cardigan Liquor Store and Eldon MacKenzie's Store, Rollo Bay, was sentenced to six months in the Kings County Jail on each of the charges. The telegraph pole was broken in half, causing interruptions in service.

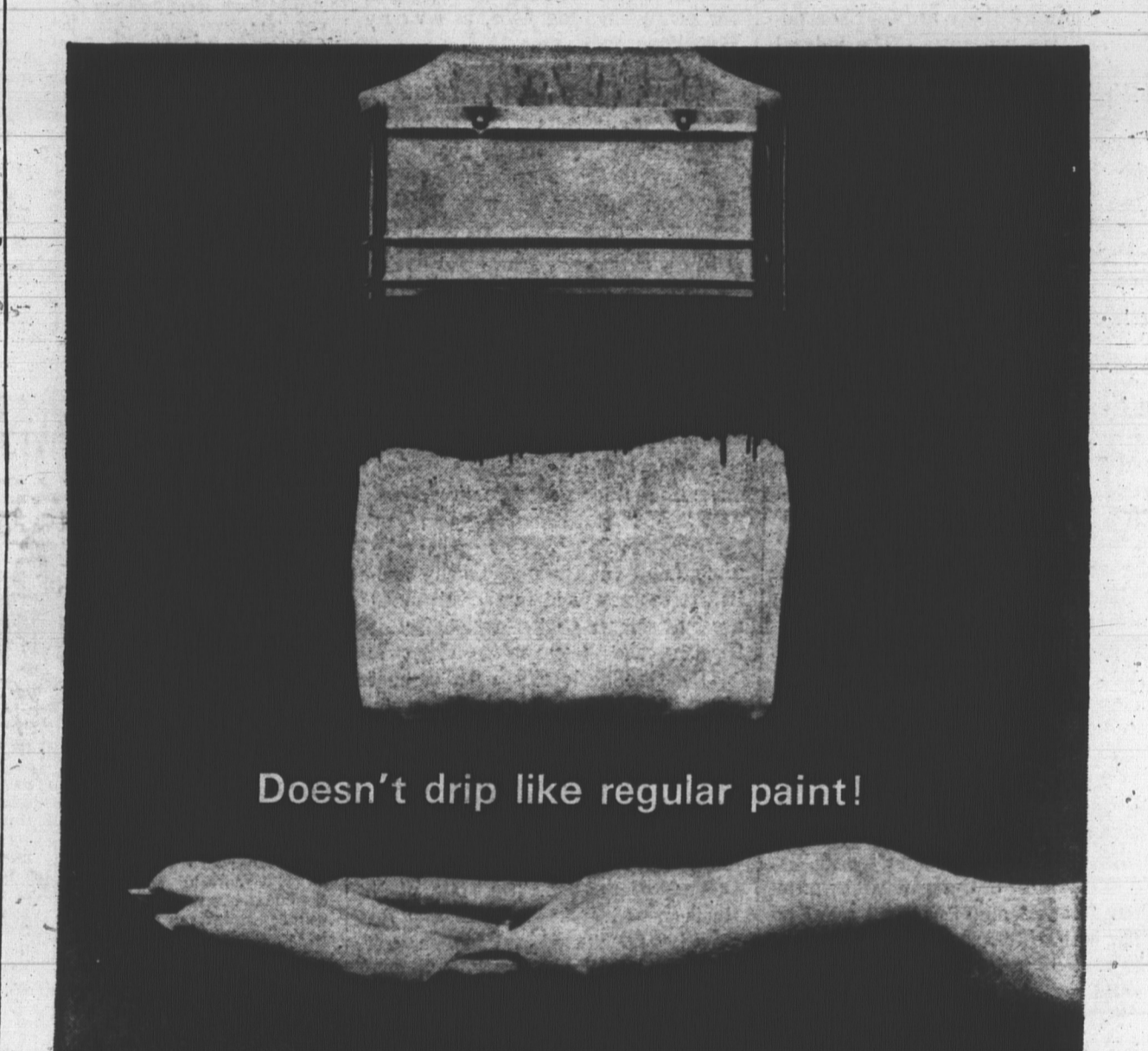
