### ATTENTION MOTHERS

Commencing on Monday next the Department of Health will start its annual protective programme in all the Charlottetown schools and in Spring Park and Parkdale against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus or Lock-Jaw, as it is generally known to the laity.

The protection consists of three doses given at four-week intervals to all infants of six months and over up to five years of age. At these clinics re-inforcing doses will be administered to pre-school children having received triple protection last year, if under five years of age, and diphtheria protection only to school children who require such protection every three years.

As Whooping Cough has been, and still is, prevalent—mothers would be well advised to take advantage of these clinics. Mothers with young children who already may have had whooping cough should remember that their children still require the diphtheria protection.

Further notice will appear in your local paper as to where and when these clinics will take place. Please watch out for it.

North was somewhat out of line in raising the three-diamond bid to four, with his distribution—a non-committal three-notrump rebid would be chosen by most experts. However, in this particular case, North's raise should have had a beautiful result, since it led to South's contracting for small slam. At notrump, with North playing the hand, East would have led a heart, and four-odd would have been the limit.

As it happened the six-diamond contract also could have been defeated by a heart lead on West's part, but South should have counseled himself extremely fortunate when West actually chose to lead the club ten. Winning with the blank ace, South laid down the ace and king of trumps, obviously hoping to drop the jack. Had he done so, dummy's third trump would have become an entry, and South would have taken all the tricks. When, however, East showed out on the second trump lead, it became impossible to reach dummy, and South ended up by conceding one spade and two hearts, for a two-trick set.

South should not have depended on the fall of the trump jack! It was all right to cash the ace of trumps, but then he should have led a low trump to dummy! (The four to the seven, or the eight to the nine). If the jack came up on this trick, well and good; South could control any lead and enter dummy with another trump, to discard his three losers on the clubs. If West, for any reason, refused to put up the trump jack on the second lead, South would be in dummy, and he could discard his three losers immediately.

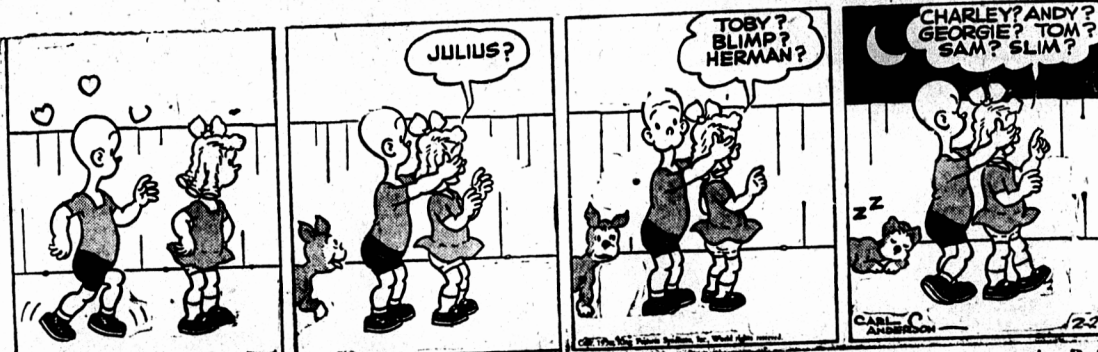
