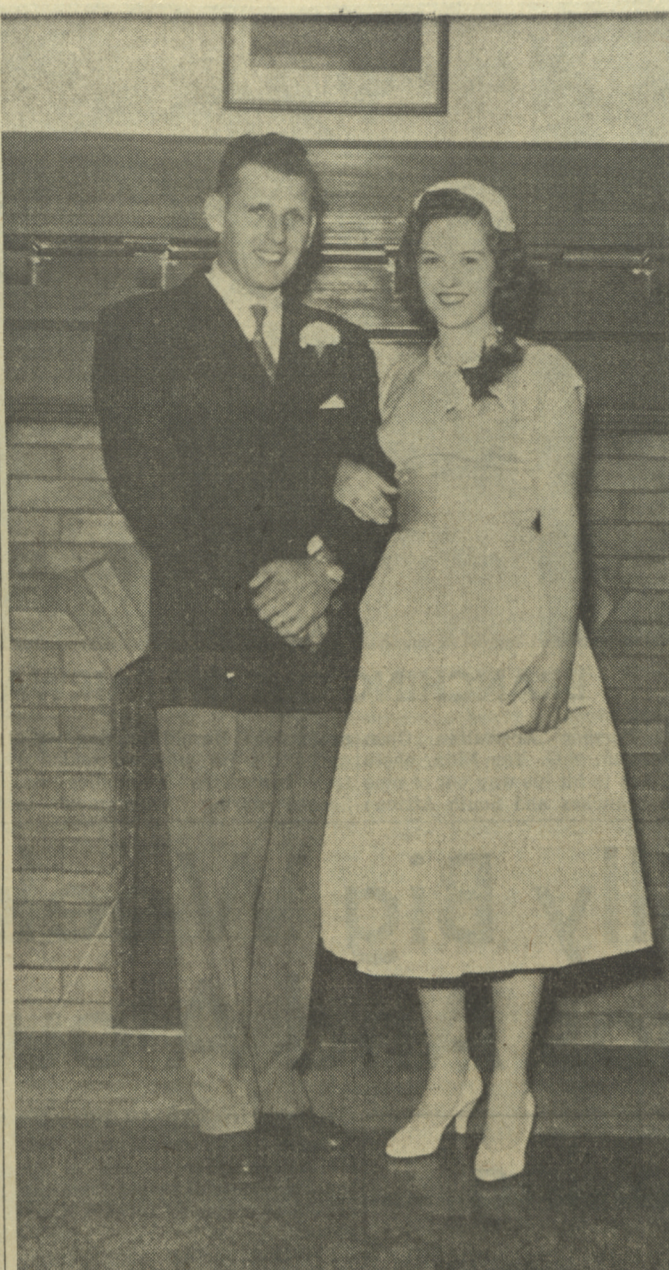

## Cardinal And Bishop Are Present At Diving Rosary

His Eminence James Cardinal McGaugan, Archbishop of Toronto and the Most Rev. Charles L. Neilligan, both natives of Prince Edward Island, were present at the 15th Annual Holy Hour and Diving Rosary ceremonies held recently in Toronto. The following is the account from the Toronto Telegram:

The largest demonstration of faith in the Blessed Eucharist in English-speaking Canada was given at the CNE grandstand yesterday.

More than 30,000 people attended the 15th Annual Holy Hour and Diving Rosary ceremonies held recently in Toronto. The following is the account from the Toronto Telegram:

There was added significance in the service. This is the year of the centennial of the visitation of Lourdes.

Most Rev. Charles L. Neilligan who delivered the sermon, had just returned from a pilgrimage at Lourdes.

Bishop Neilligan said Lourdes "is a symbol of the unity of faith in the world, and from it will come a deepening of Christian morals."

Christ he said, "should reign as King of our hearts, families and human society."

Bishop Neilligan warned there was a "wave of materialism sweeping over the world."

"There is a sort of bewilderment in the world," he added.

"CANCER" OF DIVORCE  
The Bishop described the increasing rate of divorce as "cancer" spreading because of the lack of belief in Jesus Christ.

"There is no greater good than through the Christian home. It is there that the mother can surround her children with good" he said.

Bishop Neilligan emphasized that everyone should submit themselves to Jesus Christ wholeheartedly.

More than 3,000 children participated in the ceremony.

The highlight was the formation of a living rosary by 375 girls from St. Joseph's College School.

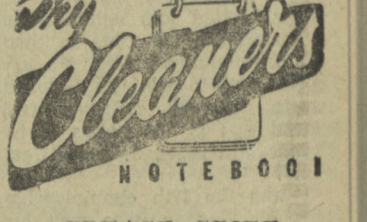
