THE POPE.

His Holiness Sued for Estate of Late Cardinal Falconieri.

ROME, November 7.—Recently there was much curiosity about the Vatican for nearly a month over a strange man who had been loitering about the entrance. He was well-dressed and well-behaved, and as the police seemed to know him the Vatican authorities could do nothing. At the beginning of the week the mystery was solved, for Cardinal Rampolla was entering his carriage the stranger shoved a writ into his hand. The stranger proved to be a bailiff of the High Court, and the writ had been issued in the suit of Count Confalsinieri against the Pope and the Vatican, whose legal representative Rampolla was held to be.

The count is the nearest surviving relative of the late Cardinal Falconieri, who died forty years ago, leaving a fortune estimated at 10,000,000 lire (about \$2,000,000). It was supposed that he left no will, and Pope Pius IX., therefore, took the property for the benefit of the Holy See, his right being then that of temporal sovereign. Recently Cardinal Confalsinieri's will was found, and it is said that he bequeathed the entire fortune to the child who is Count Confalsinieri. The latter now demands the amount, with interest.

THE WAR.

Return of Lord Roberts.

London, November 6.—The return of the remaining colonial troops from South Africa is not likely to be delayed by the renewed guerilla warfare on the part of the Boers.

While a complete scheme for the demobilization of the army in South Africa has been published and put in partial effect, the public receives day by day accounts of hostile operations in almost every quarter of the conquered republics. It is evident that the dangers from guerilla warfare have been increased since the large commandos were broken up into smaller bands. There is skirmishing everywhere, with no decisive result, as the Boers divide and subdivide and elude pursuit. The War Office will not abandon its policy of recalling surplus troops, but it will be enforced with great deliberation. The volunteers and colonials may count with confidence upon eating their Christmas dinner at home, and possibly the Guards may be equally fortunate; but the bulk of the force is likely to spend the winter on the veldt.
