AN INGENUOUS PICTURE.

It shows the Head of a Living Person Right on a Plate.

One of the latest tricks is to photograph a living head on a plate. The delusion is merely a photographic one. Photographs taken in this way show the head as being perched on a plate, which forms part of the furnishing of a dinner table. In fact, it preserves an absolutely life-like appearance. The contrivance for bringing about this remarkable delusion is so simple that any one may arrange it. It is only necessary to remove the central leg of an ordinary dining table, and to provide a plate or pan set away so that it may be conveniently placed around the neck. The person to be photographed is seated under the table so that the head appears just above the table top. The cloth and the ordinary dinner set are then arranged in the usual way. The head is put through a hole in the cloth and the plate or dish is placed closely about the neck. Of course, the delusion is heightened by the camera. Any one would recognize the deception at a glance, but the camera sees it with a more partial eye. Pictures made in this manner have often been extremely puzzling.

Criminal Identification.

The Bertillon system of identification is being introduced into the prisons of New York State. The 9,000 convicts in the ten penal institutions of the state are being subjected to the various measurements, and hereafter it will be practically impossible for any man to be arrested without his identity being known. The measurements include: the height, the length of the arm, the distance from the wrist to the elbow, the length of the thumb, and other parts of the body. Twelve measurements will be taken of each man. With more could be taken without difficulty, a less number would, in most instances, be enough for identification. From observation of the differences in the measurements of individuals in a large number of cases, authorities on the subject have computed that the chance that two men will present the same figures in twelve measurements is 1 to 1,330,000,000.

Thought She Was a Liar.

Coloring by Electrolysis.

Some coloring matters hitherto produced only by strictly chemical processes are now being manufactured electrolytically, and it seems likely that the near future will see a very large number of such substances being made by electro-chemical means. Toward the end of last year it was discovered that certain orange coloring matters can be obtained by electricity, and now this is being done on a commercial scale at Basle, in Switzerland. By reducing the yellow alkaline condensation products of nitrobenzene with sulphuric acid in an alkaline solution by means of the electric current the yellow coloring matters are converted into orange dyes. After filtering and drying, the material forms a dark brown powder easily soluble in water, with a yellowish red color, and in concentrated sulphuric acid with a dark violet blue color. It dyes unretarded cotton orange from a natural or alkaline bath fast to air, chlorine, and acids. Should this new process stand the test of time, and be found to produce dyes as good and durable as those hitherto manufactured by chemical processes, a new and important field will have been opened out for electricians who complain that the electrical profession is overcrowded.

Drilling Holes in Iron Plates with Rind.

A novel method of perforating iron plates is reported from Salt Lake City. The city is being supplied with electricity for lighting and power generated fourteen miles away in the Big Cottonwood Canyon. It was found necessary, for the purpose of pipe connections, to cut out four-inch openings in the iron plates. The plates of which were half an inch thick. The workmen began to cut with cape chisels, but the progress made was too exasperatingly slow for the engineer of the works, R. M. Jones, who is known throughout the west as the cowboy engineer. Mr. Jones took up his rifle, and, using steel bullets covered with copper, shot a line of holes through the plates from a distance of about 30 feet. The intervening edges were afterwards easily cut out, and in a very short time the job was finished.

Quarantine Story of an Old Tree.

Within a hundred yards of my window stood a great beech, now alas! victim of the gales. Some thirty years ago an arm, 7 or 8 feet from the ground, and about 60 feet long to the end of the twigs, was nearly torn from the trunk.
