WHY THEY SHOULD GO

It is pointed out by the Montreal Gazette that when the Conservatives took office the total expenditures, both revenue and capital, were \$31,541,100.

The Conservatives enlarged the canal and built the Canadian Pacific. They allowed \$10,000,000 to the provinces to keep them free from direct taxation, and spent largely on the development of the country, adding the North-West to our Empire.

When they went out the total expenditure of all kinds was \$42,371,000. This was an increase of \$10,830,000 in eighteen years.

The new Liberals found the expenditure at \$42,371,000. They have done nothing much, but last year they spent \$51,542,000. This was an increase of \$9,171,000 in four years.

The Conservatives do more and spend less than do the new Liberals.

The taxes in 1879 aggregated \$18,476,000. In 1896 there were \$27,446,000—an increase of \$8,970,000 in eighteen years.

In 1896 the taxes were \$27,446,000; in 1900, under the new Liberals, they were \$37,919,000—an increase of \$10,473,000 in ten years.

The new Liberals bleed the people of their earnings, and they ought to go.

TOO SMALL FOR THE JOB.

The Liberal party is like Baalam. Though it rode into power on an asinine policy, it remained to bless and not curse the policy of the Liberal-Conservatives.

A discriminating public, when election time comes, will continue the parable to the end. It is better to trust a party with honest, sound convictions than one which eats its words, steals its opponent's clothes, and masquerades in a suit that is too big for it.

The Liberal party has endorsed the Conservative policy. Let Canada elect those who originated and believe in it. All the present government has done is to mangle the ideas of its predecessors and block progress.

It is a miracle a big contract without sufficient capital in brains.—Ottawa Citizen.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It has been discovered that Dr. Bordwell's claims for the troops were purchased from a manufacturer of dog biscuits in New Jersey. Many of the party papers are representing these rations as "extras," or delicacies for the country's defenders. Seeing that they were "extras" it is argued that the quality does not matter. But if any of the party writers were given dog biscuits for desert they would never forgive the caterer.

—The Scottish-American remarks on the great boom the war has given military enthusiasm in Britain. Though there are 200,000 British troops in South Africa all the barracks at home are at present fuller than before the outbreak of the war. At Woolwich recruits are coming in at the rate of forty a day, and as the barracks are full it has been found necessary to erect tents on the common there for sleeping accommodation. All this helps to explain where soldiers come from without conscription when Britain needs them.

COTTON OPERATIVES STRIKE.

A Serious Trouble at Valleyfield, Quebec.

VALLEYFIELD, Que., July 13.—The weavers in the Empire Mill of the Montreal Cotton Co. went on strike yesterday because of the employment of an Englishman. Last evening the operatives in the other departments met and condemned the strike. This morning these operatives went to work as usual and worked until noon. When they endeavored to enter the mill at 1 o'clock the striking weavers attempted to prevent them by force. They failed in this and then attempted to carry the mill by storm. The operatives inside the mill made a spirited resistance and eventually drove the attackers off. The mob stoned the windows of the mill facing the street and two or three people were injured, one woman quite seriously. To-night there is great excitement. 2400 operatives are affected by the strike. The Mayor was called upon for police protection but neglected to take any notice of the matter.

THE APOSTOLIC DELEGATE.

Mgr. Falconio, who recently visited Charlottetown, was born on the 20th of September, 1842, at Pescocostanza, Italy. While a youth he entered the Order of St. Francis, and after completing his studies was sent to the United States and ordained priest on the 4th of January, 1866, by Mgr. Timon, Bishop of Buffalo. After teaching for some years in various capacities at different colleges he was entrusted by Mgr. Caragnini, Bishop of Harbor Grace, with a delicate mission to Newfoundland, which he managed with such ability as to induce Mgr. Caragnini to appoint him his secretary. Returning to the United States in 1882, Mgr. Falconio was elected to the Principalship of the Order of St. Francis in Abruzzo and recalled to Italy in 1884. There for the next eight years he occupied successive posts of honor and responsibility, and was entrusted with several delicate missions in various Franciscan provinces. In 1892 he was proclaimed Bishop-elect of Lacedonia by His Holiness Pope Leo XIII., and was consecrated at Rome. His success as an administrator induced the Holy Father to place in his charge the United States of Acerenza and Matera, which included the spiritual charge of 150,000 souls. In August last Pope Leo appointed him Delegate Apostolic to Canada.

Annexed to Great Britain.

VANCOUVER, July 14.—Great Britain has added another to her island possessions in the Pacific. H. M. S. 'Porpoise' in June planted the British flag on Niue or Savage Island, situated 500 miles northeast of the Tongan group. The principal product is copra, of which 700 tons are exported annually. The soil is very fertile. The terms of the British protectorate over Tonga have been modified as a result of a conference between Mr. Basil Thomson, the British representative, and the Tongan King and chiefs, when an agreement was signed by which no treaty is to be made without Great Britain's assent. In case of the Tongan Government being in need of assistance it is to apply only to the British Government, and not to any other power.

Outbreak of Cannibalism.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 14.—The steamship Mowera, from Australia, brings details of a ghastly South Sea tragedy. A party of white bushmen were captured and eaten by New Britain cannibals. A number of the victims watched some of their number eaten. It is the worst case reported from the South Seas in years.
