Here is an on-the-spot report of a fantastic hand I witnessed recently in a rubber bridge game at New York's famed Cavendish Club.
East opened with two spades and West made the negative response of two notrump. North, somewhat mystified by the shenanigans that were taking place, bid three notrump, an artificial call requesting partner to respond in his best minor suit.

When East bid four spades South boldly went to five diamonds, which rolled around to the opener who belatedly named hearts.

Eisenhower Orders Full Probe Surrender Stories

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators disclosed Wednesday night that President Eisenhower has ordered a top-to-bottom investigation of published reports that U.S. officials are studying the possibility of surrender by the United States in a future nuclear war.
One senator, who refused use of his name because he said the president and defence leaders had urged secrecy on the matter, said:
"I've never seen the president so mad. He had not even heard of the rumor and he turned everything upside down in the Pentagon getting to the bottom of it."
The senate source said that Defence Secretary Neil H. McElroy and Deputy Defence Secretary Donald A. Quarles had assured the president and Republican senators that "there is no thought or plan for surrender and the studies were only theoretical."

He added that the directive for the study had been made by John B. MacAuley, deputy assistant defence secretary for research and engineering.

EXPLAINS STUDIES
MacAuley made a trip to the Senate to explain that part of an overall study of all possibilities of an all-out war between the U.S. and Russia had included the conditions under which either Soviet Russia or the U.S. might be forced to surrender.
It was learned that the president first heard of the study from Senators William F. Knowland (Rep. Calif.), Styles Bridges (Rep.-N.H.) and Everett N. Dirksen (Rep.-Ill.) at a White House conference last Tuesday.

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This drew a six diamond bid from North, followed by six hearts from West. North's seven diamond bid became the final contract after West doubled.
Maybe all these bids won't meet with everybody's approval, but this is a verbatim report of what took place.
Declarer ruffed the spade lead in dummy, cashed the ace of diamonds, and then overtook the queen with the king. Now he led the eight of clubs, intending to let the eight ride because he had decided East had no clubs.
But West was right on his toes. He covered the eight with the ten. Declarer finessed the jack, and sure enough, East showed out.
The ace of hearts was cashed and a heart was ruffed. South then played the six of clubs and West was careful to cover with the seven. Taken with the queen.

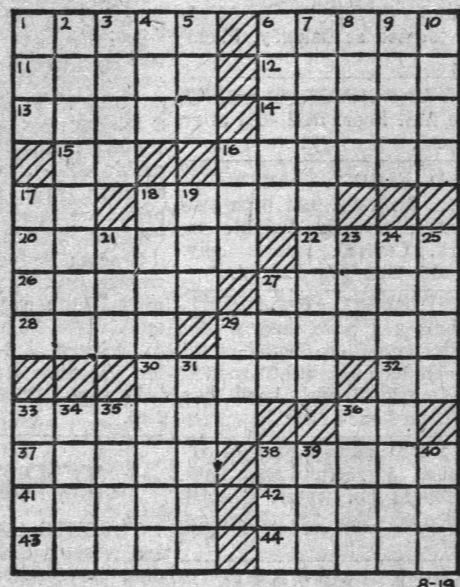
After returning to his hand by trumping a heart, South led the nine of clubs, covered by the king, and taken with the ace. Declarer had to go down one.
West took the setting trick with the five of clubs, since dummy remained with the 3-2 and declarer had the four - spot left.
So it turned out that East, who had opened with a two-bid, never took a trick, and West defeated the grand slam because he happened to have dealt the five of clubs instead of the four.
But the whole hand turned out to be an utter waste of time. North had 100 honors, and there was no score.

Next Move Is Up To Sons Of Freedom

OTTAWA (CP)—The next move is up to the Sons of Freedom Doukhobors.
If Russia will have them and they're serious about leaving Canada, they had the way to their land of origin paved Friday with federal and British Columbia offers of cash assistance.
The joint federal-B.C. agreement was announced in the Commons by Justice Minister Fulton and in Victoria by Attorney-General Robert Bonner. Its two main points are:
1. The federal government will pay the full cost of transportation back to Russia for any Sons of Freedom members who want to go. Their numbers are estimated a from 2,000 to possibly 3,000.
2. The B.C. government will provide financial assistance not exceeding federal transportation outlays for any Freedomites who re-establish in Russia.
The joint statement attaches only this condition: "That all such financial assistance will be made available only to persons renouncing Canadian citizenship."

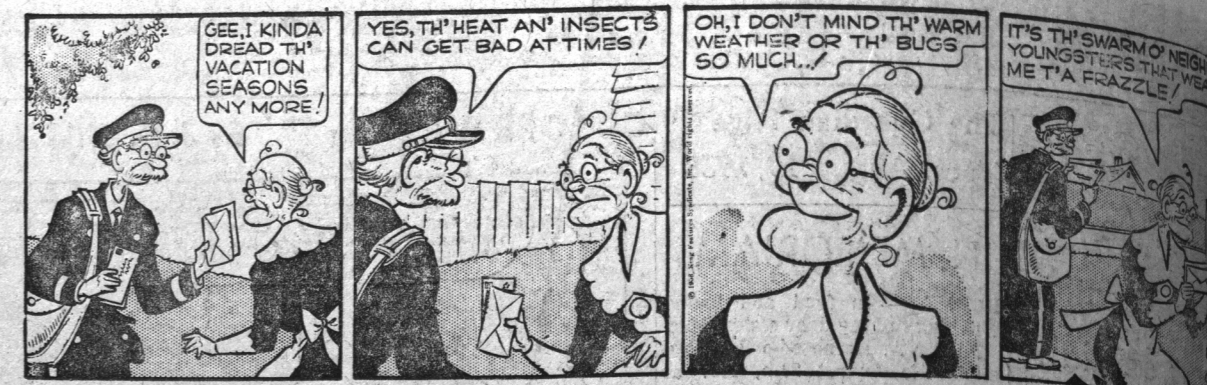

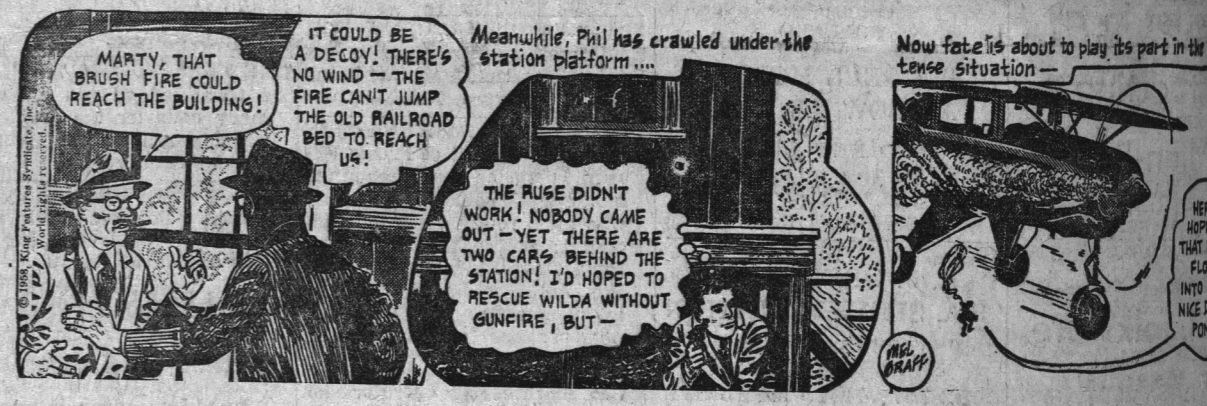
