Red Cross Headquarters Organizing 4 Day Camps

Provincial Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown and other centres on the Island have been organizing four day camps which will be conducted at four centres on the Island during the months of July and August. The day camps are a relatively new phase in the Island Water Safety Program.

Last year was the first time that the day camps were held on the Island. This year they are being held at the same places which include O'Leary, Kensington, Souris and Morell.

The camp at O'Leary starts July 4th. All camps will be conducted by a team of qualified Red Cross Water Safety Instructors. The camp will be held at Cedar Dunes Park, West Point.

Regional High School buses will be supplying the transportation to and from camp. Each child will remain at the camp for two hours each day, however the camps themselves will be operating all day. Once one bus of children have finished their two hours they will leave and at the same time another bus load of children will be coming for their two hours at camp.

Activities will include films, sport participation including swimming and water safety instruction. A swimming area will be enclosed and watched by qualified personnel at all times.

From O'Leary the camp moves to Kensington where a camp will be established at a private beach at Clinton. Chairman of this camp are Mrs. Frank McNutt and "Buddy" McEwen.

Souris will be visited next. Organizing the camp there will be Mr. and Mrs. Roy Coffin. At Morell Charles Campbell and Daniel MacDonald will be organizing camp.

Programs at each camp are very similar and it is expected at the end of each day 500 or 600 children will have participated.

The project has been made possible by the generous donation of the Canadian Red Cross Society, the Department of Physical Education and the Regional Water Safety Committees.

U.S. Planes Being Moved

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States will pull some 30 transport planes out of France by late July and station them in England in the first such shift of U.S. forces since French President de Gaulle ordered American and NATO forces out of France.

This imminent move was reported Wednesday by informed government sources.

Involved are two squadrons which operate on a rotational basis from the United States. Such squadrons are stationed at Evreux air base.

In addition, the sources said, U.S. reconnaissance planes now stationed in France will be moved elsewhere. It was not immediately clear when this will be done.

Marketplace Blamed For Price Boost

CHICAGO (CP) - The marketplace, rather than the manufacturer, is largely to blame for spiralling prices of consumer goods whenever new packaging is introduced, a Toronto housewife told marketing experts today.

Mrs. Eric Haworth told the American Marketing Association's world congress of marketing that "many manufacturers try to give the public a fair shake for its money."

However, "in the seething competition of the marketplace... no holds are barred and often-times well-known brands are guilty of some highly dubious practices in pricing when introducing new packaging."

She attacked the inadequate packaging of some products.

"Today's busy housewife and mother just hasn't time to molly-coddle packaging," she said.

She criticized the packaging of odd weights and the difference in U.S. and Canadian liquid measurements. The American gallon is less in amount than the Canadian Imperial gallon.
