THE Schooner Avia arrived here on Monday with coal to F. T. Newbery from New York. She got ashore on Indian Rocks on Sunday morning. After throwing out over thirty tons of the cargo the vessel floated and reached port without any damage to her hull.

THE Roller Skating Rink opened last evening with a large attendance. The Band of the 2nd Battalion was present, and discoursed excellent music. Judging from the accommodation of the rink, its fine interior appearance and the good order which prevailed during the evening, the roller rink will be a grand success in Charlottetown. Messrs. Baker & Nuttall are to be congratulated on their enterprise.

THE schooner Ellis Sweet, cleared on Saturday for the British West Indies, with a valuable cargo shipped by F. T. Newbery, comprising 233 sacks white oats; 25 sacks black oats; 62 bbls potatoes; 85 bales hay, and twelve horses, estimated to be worth \$7500. She took a handsome pair of bays and other carriage horses—the finest shipped from here to the West Indies. They will be a credit to the Island if they arrive safe.

THE excursion on the Cape Traverse Branch Railway, to raise a fund for the benefit of the St. Paul's Catholic Church of Summerside, promises to be the most enjoyable affair of the season. The committee who have it in charge, under the superintendence of the popular pastor, Father Doyle, intend making preparations to entertain from six to ten thousand excursionists. THE first monument erected in the Peoples' Cemetery is that over the grave of Mrs. James Faucher. It is neat in design, the workmanship displayed is excellent, and it reflects great credit on the establishment which produced it—Messrs. Cairns & McLean, Kent Street. It has a freestone base, a square column of white marble, and a well designed top in the form of Doric, surmounted by a well designed and neat urn. [SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] THE RIEL REBELLION Movement of Troops. SURRENDER OF INDIANS.

PRINCE ALBERT, May 25. General Middleton, with the Midland Battalion, a large number of scouts and fifty men of "A" Battery, left by the boats for Battleford on Thursday last, the 90th Battalion left on Friday, and the rest of the force will leave for the north as soon as other boats arrive.

Yesterday a young chief, a nephew of Poundmaker, came into camp and said the old chief was at Eagle Hills, seventy miles from this camp, and was anxious to surrender.

Middleton demands his unconditional surrender. The telegraph is now working between here and the west, after a cessation of two months.

The prisoners now in camp will be brought before Col. Irving at once for preliminary examination.

Big Bull and Star Llanek, the former the second biggest Cree chief in the Northwest, have expressed their loyalty to the Queen.

Beardy and Little Chief have surrendered.

Poundmaker Surrenders.

THE INDIAN REBELLION FIZZLES.

"Our Boys" Rejoicing at the Front and Thinking of Home.

BATTLEFORD, May 26.

Poundmaker has surrendered unconditionally.

Hundreds of Indians are coming in and laying down their arms.

The rebellion is practically over.

Big Bear talks of fighting near Fort Pitt, but he will doubtless "come in" when he hears of Poundmaker's surrender.

There is a general feeling of relief here, and the boys are rejoicing over the prospect of a speedy return home.

Riel's Trial.

HALIFAX, May 25.

The Herald this morning publishes an important letter, evidently written by an eminent jurist, in which it is shown that there is no martial law in Canada by which Riel can be tried, and that he must therefore be tried by a civil court.

Riel in Jail.

MOOSE JAW, May 25.

The Halifax battalion arrived at this point on Saturday.

Riel has been committed to prison at Regina, fifty miles west of this place.

THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION.

The Result of Butting Against an Iceberg.

HALIFAX, May 26.

The Queen's Birthday celebration was generally observed here to-day.

Five hundred persons attended Mrs. Richey's "At Home," which was a grand success.

The barque Alma, from Rochefort for Bridgewater, has arrived here with bows smashed in by icebergs.

RUSSIA'S SECRET WAYS.

The Czar Rewards Komaroff

BERLIN, May 25.

It is reported here that Russia has an Agent at Cabul who has been there for months disguised as a native.

The Czar has presented General Komaroff with a hundred thousand roubles.

Communists Sufferings and Threatenings.

PARIS, May 26.

During Sunday's fight between the police and the Communists, five of the Communists were killed and thirty were wounded.

The Communists vow vengeance and threaten to retaliate upon the authorities with dynamite and other weapons of modern warfare.

The Communists will attend Victor Hugo's funeral in a body carrying the red flag, and a riot is anticipated.

Invalid Soldiers—Train Wrecking—Arabs Killed.

SUAKIN, May 24.

Eleven hundred British soldiers were invalidated here in April and May.

Several hundred arabs were killed yesterday by an armoured train while tearing up the railway track.

A Delusive Snare.

DUBLIN, May 25.

The United Ireland, whose editor is Mr. O'Brien, M.P., denounces the new Land Purchase Bill as a delusive snare, intended not to benefit the Irish people, but to catch votes of the Ulster Whigs.

International Scull Race.

NEW ORLEANS, May 26. Teemer won the International three-mile scull race in twenty minutes and one and a half seconds, by two lengths. This is said to be the best time on record. Gardiner came in second.

The Consul General.

HALIFAX, May 26. The Hon. H. M. Phalen—a native of Cape Breton, and brother of the Rev. D. S. Phalen, D. D. now of St. Louis—has been appointed Consul General of the United States.

Victor Hugo's Funeral.

PARIS, May 25. The people here are profoundly grieved over Victor Hugo's death. The whole nation is in mourning, and the funeral will be one of the grandest ever seen in France.

Sanitary.

ROME, May 25. The International Sanitary Conference in session here, have voted the land quarantine useless.

PARIS, May 25. A riot took place here yesterday over the celebration of the anniversary of the fall of the Commune.

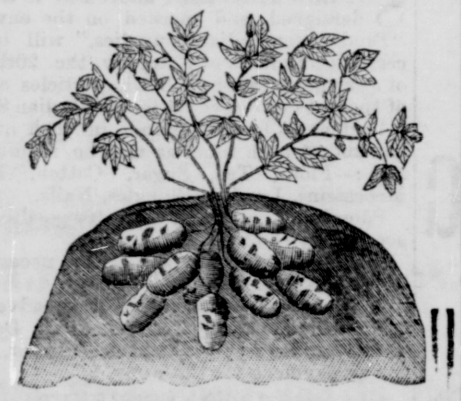

A By-Law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate, Personal Property and Income for the current year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

"1. A Discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent. shall be allowed to all Tax-payers who shall, on or before the FIFTEENTH DAY OF JULY, A. D. 1885, pay to the City Clerk, at his Office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate, Personal Property and Income.

A By Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate, Personal Property and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown. (Passed 23rd May, 1885.)

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D., 1885, and ending 31st of December, A. D., 1885, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Real Estate, made and duly returned by them on the Eleventh day of April, A. D., 1885.

2nd. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D., 1885, and ending 31st day of December, A. D., 1885, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-third of one per cent. on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their Valuation Roll of such personal property made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of May, A. D., 1885.

3. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D., 1885, and ending 31st of December, A. D., 1885, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one tenth of one per cent. on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly Income salaries, or receipts, of all persons, partnerships and corporations as assessed by the assessors of the said city in their valuation roll of such Income, made and duly returned by them on the eleventh day of April, A. D. 1885.
