

Chicken Pot Pie.

Join the chicken and parboil it. Make a crust the same as for soda biscuit, line the side of the pot (not the bottom) with this; with the chicken lay in thin sliced potatoes, sprinkle with a little pepper, add salt and a bit of mace. If there was not broth enough left after parboiling the chicken add water sufficient to cover the chicken when put in the pot; over the whole lay a slice of crust about the thickness of soda biscuit. Fold a towel and put over the pot, and put on the cover. The towel will hold the steam which rises, and prevent its falling back upon the crust to make it heavy. Before putting in the broth it should be thickened a little, and a little butter added.

Farmer's Gingerbread.—One teaspoonful of New Orleans molasses and two tablespoonfuls of water boiling hot. Stir into the water a teaspoonful of soda and turp into the water.
