LAST BUT ONE. DEFEATED CONSERVATIVES WRITE ELECTORS.

A London Scandal—Storm in G. Britain.

(SPECIAL TO THE GUARDIAN.)

LONDON, July 20.—The last of the elections, except in the Orkney Islands, have been held. South Tipperary, which gives Manville, Anti-Parnellite, nearly two thousand of a majority.
Several defeated Conservative candidates have issued addresses to the electors saying the country will undoubtedly be called upon for another contest.

The associated press correspondent had an interview yesterday with several prominent liberals on the outcome of the elections. Some venture to forecast the exact dates of the different events. Thus the momentous division on the amendment ousting the government is set down for the 19th of August, the resignation of Lord Salisbury for August 20, and the adjournment of parliament for August 22; a period of one month being occupied in the re-election of ministers and the formation of the cabinet, the house formally re-assembling at the end of September and the real work beginning about the end of January. Events then, it is thought, will absolutely depend upon the prudence of the Irish members. If they insist upon the immediate precedence of the home rule bill they will play into the hands of the Conservatives, who want the earliest possible re-appeal to the country, having full confidence they will obtain better results in a re-contest. The sum of today's position is that the Liberals, meaning to play for two or three sessions before dissolving parliament, will not rush the home rule bill. If constrained to give it precedence they will not accept its rejection by the house of lords as necessitating an immediate dissolution, but will proceed with measures tending to strengthen the Liberal vote throughout the country.

A London Scandal.

LONDON, July 20.—The Star today says the Rev. John Edwards, for years private chaplain to Lord Salisbury, and lately rector of Essenden, of which Salisbury is the patron, has fled the country to escape imprisonment for gross offences. Rev. Lord William Cecil, second son of Lord Salisbury, is said to be connected with the offence.

After a Long Fight.

OWEN SOUND, July 20.—Thirteen years ago W. J. Woods became part owner in an undeveloped silver mine which was subsequently opened up. After a long legal fight, his widow and heirs obtained over a million dollars and will share in future operations.

More Combines.

TORONTO, July 20.—Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, London and Guelph merchants, who made a linseed oil combine have now developed an Ontario turpentine association on same principle.

Accepted the Call.

HALIFAX, July 20.—Rev. E. P. Crawford of Hamilton, Ont., has accepted the call to St. Luke's Cathedral at a salary of \$2000 a year.

Storm in Great Britain.

LONDON, July 20.—High winds and heavy rains are general throughout Great Britain today. Many mishaps to vessels are reported.

Eighty Thousand Carry Cholera.

BAKU, (Asiatic Russia) July 20.—Eighty thousand persons have left the city carrying cholera infection throughout the Empire.

Premier Abbott Fishing.

OTTAWA, July 20.—Premier Abbott has gone to the Restigouche fishing.

Still Coughing Up Stones.

CATANIA, July 18.—The eruption of Mount Etna continues. Throughout the night from the different craters stones and ashes were projected to a height of 1,200 feet.

A Liberal Convention.

TORONTO, July 19.—The Kingston Whig, Toronto Globe, Woodstock Sentinel, St. Thomas Journal and Brockville Recorder are all advocating the holding of a monster Liberal convention in the autumn. It will probably be held at Toronto.

Rumor re Prince of Wales.

QUEBEC, July 18.—It is stated that the Prince of Wales will visit Canada next year and make a trip to the Pacific coast over the Canadian Pacific railway, visiting the Chicago fair en route. When in Quebec his royal highness will open the new Hotel de Touraine.

Prohibition Commission.

MONTREAL, July 19.—F. S. Spence, secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance and temperance champion before the royal commission, left town this evening for Halifax, to attend the opening meeting on the 25th instant.

Against Undenominational Schools.

WINNIPEG, July 15.—It has transpired that the Catholic priests are taking a hand in the local campaign, going from house to house in the districts where they live and urging them to vote for the opposition.

Chill Will Pay.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The secretary of state announced that an entirely cordial and mutually satisfactory settlement has been reached between the governments of the United States and Chili respecting the indemnity to be paid by the latter on account of the assault upon the crew of the Baltimore. Seventy-five thousand dollars in gold will be distributed among the families of the two men who lost their lives, (one a P. E. Islander), and to the surviving members of the crew who were wounded.

Trapping the Potato Bug.

A farmer successfully tried a remedy for potato bugs as follows: He procured some boards and placed them here and there among his potatoes, and on these boards he placed raw potatoes sliced. At noon on the first day of his experiment he and his hired man found every piece of potato covered with bugs. He killed this crop, and at night another crop was killed, though not so large, and in a week not a bug could be seen, and his trouble with bugs after this was comparatively small. Dip the pieces of potatoes in Paris green and save killing the bugs.—Moncton Times.

The Smugglers.

QUEBEC, July 19.—The government cruisers Acadia and Canadienne have captured the schooner Willie, of Quebec, off Anticosti, with a part of Bouchard's smuggled whiskey on board. Bouchard and his schooner the Bay, of Quebec, are supposed to be somewhere in the gulf. The cruiser Constance has received a further supply of ammunition and is still looking for the smugglers.

Labor Day in Halifax.

HALIFAX, July 19.—This was labor day in Halifax. It was observed throughout the entire city as a complete holiday. The procession marched through the streets in the morning, consisting of two thousand artisans and workers of all kinds, accompanied by half a dozen bands. Many of the firms of the city made a display of their wares. The countermarch on Spring Garden road was witnessed by Cardinal Gibbons and Archbishop O'Brien. Afterwards there was a gigantic picnic at McNab's, and it was attended by 3,000 persons. This evening a band concert in the public gardens wound up the day.

Self-Maimed.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 18.—A curious case has come under the notice of the physicians at Kingston penitentiary. A convict was apparently attacked by a nervous disease. He could not use his hands, and the cords of his feet became contracted. He had to hold them off the floor in a slanting position. What was a strange thing to the doctor was that there were no other symptoms, which should have been noticeable. The prisoner was closely questioned, and finally admitted that his sickness was due to himself. He practised twitching of the nerves of the hand until it became natural, and kept his feet in such a position for so long that he could not get the cords straightened. He did this to escape work on the stone pile.

The Camera Will do it.

PIZZBURG, Pa., July 18.—The day of reckoning for the Homestead strikers has begun.

Millions of Lobsters.

The Marine and Fisheries Department has issued bulletin No. 2 on the use of the floating incubators for hatching the ova of the lobster. It is admitted by everyone connected with the Canadian lobster industry that the general destruction of female lobsters carrying ova has been one of the most important factors in the depletion of the fishery. Various observers are agreed that an average sized adult female lobster carries between 20,000 and 25,000 ova. If these are collected and hatched out artificially the fishery will soon improve. Artificial hatching has been successfully carried out by Mr. Neilson, the superintendent of fisheries for Newfoundland, and the model of incubator adopted in Canada is in outline similar to the Neilson one, but modified by the addition of an inner trough, an improvement designed by Mr. Wilmet, the superintendent of fish culture for the Dominion. Some valuable hints are given in the bulletin.

The Lottery Must Go.

The Canadian says: "The information in our session obliges us to insist upon Mr. DeBoucherville asking the proprietors of the Province of Quebec Lottery for an account of their operations. The Canadian has never undertaken a campaign against abuses without having serious reasons to believe itself to be in the right, and now it calls the special attention of the Prime Minister of the Province to the necessity of having a public investigation on the working of the lottery, whose existence he has authorized on account of special circumstances. The Canadian holds, at the disposal of the Executive, a number of facts and proofs which will leave no other alternative for the Cabinet but to withdraw from the lottery the permit which it has secured."

Gold-cure Keeley Taxed as a Liquor Dealer.

(St. Louis Daily Globe-Democrat.)
The revenue department has made a ruling on Dr. Keeley, of gold cure fame, who furnishes whiskey to his patients by the dram and by the bottle. He is considered by the United States government as a retail dealer in liquor and liable to the regular government tax. The Kansas City collector notified the St. Joseph Keeley institute of this fact, and they referred the matter to their headquarters at Dwight, Ill. The Keeley company at once made a vigorous protest to the department at Washington against being classed with saloon keepers. Uncle Sam's rules, however, are inflexible, and the protest referred to brought a letter from Commissioner Mason, in which he explains that matter very plainly. The Keeley people objected to the declaration under oath that they are retail liquor dealers. Commissioner Mason says that every druggist who sells whiskey or other spirits, not combined with drugs, though he furnishes the spirits on a physician's prescription, and for medicinal use only, is required to pay special tax as a retail liquor dealer.

Towed out to Sea by a Sword-Fish.

Boston, July 14.—The steamer Henry Dumois, which arrived at this port today from Port Antonio, Jamaica, reports that on July 13th, at a. m., when about forty miles southeast of South Shoal Lightship she picked up a fisherman in a dory that had gone astray from his vessel. He said his name was John Calder and that he belonged to the schooner Mary E Hagan of Portland, Me. He had been sword fishing, and was towed several miles to sea by a sword fish which he harpooned at about 7 o'clock on the morning of the 12th. He was towed until dusk at night. He managed to hang on to the fish, which weighed about 300 pounds, and on the arrival of the Dumois this morning he disposed of it to the marketmen.

Mr. Balfour Unconcerned.

In a speech at Glasgow, Mr. Balfour said he did not regard the present situation with alarm except as regards foreign affairs. He had much misgivings as to the course that would be taken in Egypt and other parts of Africa. He had no fear in regard to the Home Rule Bill for Ireland which, he said, is not likely to be passed in our time. He held that the Unionists would be strong enough to control the legislative folly of their successors.

Bermuda's New Governor.

BERMUDA, July 18.—Lieut. General Lyons arrived here yesterday and came ashore in the government tender "Advantage." A guard of honor with a band was in attendance. He was sworn in as governor today.
