A GENERAL BREAK-UP

Judging by the signs of the times along the line the Liberal machine will soon break up.

Advices from British Columbia state that Premier Semlin and Attorney General Martin are at loggerheads. The former has asked the latter to resign. Mr. Martin is charged by the Premier with three things, any one of which is sufficient to disqualify him; namely: disgraceful conduct at a banquet unbecoming a Cabinet Minister, by which he brought the Government into disrepute, neglect of duty as Attorney General, and disclosing Cabinet secrets to outsiders. From what we know of Mr. Martin's doings in Manitoba it is easy to believe that any and all of these charges are true. At any rate the Premier has the power to eject Martin and evidently intends to do so. This will relieve the British Columbia government of the chief of the Liberal machine politicians and will probably result in a general election in which the Conservative party of the Western Province will regain its preponderance in public affairs.

Reports from Manitoba confirm the impression that Hugh John Macdonald, the Conservative leader, is rapidly rising in the confidence of the people, while the machine upon which Premier Greenway depends has failed to prevent the Conservatives from adding largely to their numbers on the voters list. In Manitoba, too, a change of government is imminent.

The Liberal papers state that Hon. Mr. Hardy is about to retire from the Premiership of Ontario. This fact, taken in connection with the popular disgust which has naturally followed the scandalous disclosures in the West Elgin and other election cases, points to the break-up of the Liberal machine in Ontario.

In this Province, as well as in Nova Scotia, the people are sick and tired of Liberal management resulting in constantly increasing debt and taxation, neglect of all public interests, and the most glaring abandonment of principles which Liberals throughout the country hold dear. The machine, double acting as it is, cannot sustain Premier Farquharson much longer.

All over Canada there is prospect of a brighter and better political day.

Advices from the West state that much righteous indignation is felt by the Acadians of Tignish because of the action of Premier Farquharson in bringing on his election now and making use of their centenary celebration as a means of propagating the orders of the machine. They say that he is attempting to stir up animosities when a love feast was prepared for the Acadian family as a commemoration of the landing of eight Acadians in Tignish one hundred years ago, and if Premier Farquharson could leave them unrepresented for a whole year, he could surely have let this feast pass without political turmoil and his cheap devices. They all believe that their feast on the 19th is taken advantage of, and nomination made on the 18th.

Reports from the Soudan indicate that the September campaign against the Khalifa will not evolve much fighting. The Dervishes are deserting him, and those who remain are suffering from disease and famine.

The latest official statement, subject to revision, shows that the Customs taxation of the year ended June 30 last, was nearly three and a-half millions greater than the Customs taxation of the previous year. So the Liberals perform their penance to relieve the country from "the burden of customs taxation."

LIBERAL COURAGE.

A few weeks ago Mr. Sifton travelly said:

"I challenge the member for Pictou or any other man in the House," "to lay upon the table the charges he has to make, and declare his ability to substantiate them by evidence, and he will get his investigation, and I will be able to convince the hon. gentleman who makes the charge that discretion on his part would have been the better part of valour."

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper accepted this challenge, tabled his charges; stated that he was prepared to prove them; declared that he would retire from Parliament if he were unable to demonstrate that they were essentially true. Now Mr. Sifton sneaks away under cover of the report of a partial, whitewashing, ad captum investigation that has been held before Mr. Ogilvie, one of his own relations, and is aided in doing so by the Government majority in the House of Commons.

A day or two ago, Dr. Sproule went so far as to say that the Governor-General would be justified under all the circumstances in dismissing the Government; and who will dare say that Mr. Sproule was not right?

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The West Elgin election case is rank; it smells to heaven.

It is true that, despite all Liberal precautions the revision of voters lists in Manitoba shows large gains for the Conservatives, the Greenway goose is cooked as well as that of Farquharson.

Advices by telephone state that, at a convention of the Liberal-Conservatives of the first district of Prince County, held at Alberton, yesterday, Mr. Henry J. Pieno, was selected as a candidate to oppose the unseaed Meddie Gallant.

It has been pointed out that the breaking away of the government supporters in the House of Commons, as illustrated in the Yukon railway contract and Yukon scandals, is the preliminary to the present Liberal Government's downfall. The Gazette remarks that the situation at present is the more menacing, also, because the Liberals breaking away is on a matter of deal. People may respect public men who go wrong on an issue like the school question; they will not respect public men who go wrong on jobs.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Mail and Empire: Tammany's reputation has always been unsavoury, but at present the Ontario machine seems to be a little more so.

Montreal Gazette: In England they neither understand nor approve of officials, or a government responsible for their acts, being content to rest under charges of public dishonesty. The Laurier Government may discover before long, too, that Canadians, if they understand, do not approve of such a course, any more than Englishmen.
