A BAD EXAMPLE.

WHAT a hue and cry would have been raised four years ago by the false Liberal leaders and their press if a Conservative Minister of the Crown had used a Government steamer to promote his personal or his electioneering pursuits! But the government steamer Brant was taken from her mooring in Charlottetown yesterday morning and sent to Point du Coque, not on public duty, but to enable Mr. Blair to address a public meeting at Summerside, and the Liberal leaders and their press are now all smiles. Even the most outrageous and wasteful misdirection of public property is winked at or openly commended by the reptile press. As the Stanley was sent on the Lord's Day to bring over Mr. Peters for a party purpose, so the Brant was sent yesterday, hundreds of miles, at the public expense, to bring over Mr. Blair for party purposes. The case is undeniably. But it is one of many. The Liberal Leaders seem to think that public property, before everything else, is for their special use and benefit. Witness the scandalous act of Mr. Martie who, two or three years ago took the Government steamer Eureka for a lengthy pleasure trip in which he and his friends held high carnival, and charged the whole cost to "wharves in P. E. Island!" The example of the Master of the Administration is now being followed by his subordinates in the cabinet and by high officials. The question whether or not it is right to do that which they desire to do is a secondary consideration. Recklessness and extravagance pervade the public service and the ministers of the Crown—pledged to economy—lead the pace.

"The Conservative candidates and the Conservative Press in general are busily engaged in resurrecting issues long since dead, in delving in half forgotten lore for the records of the past, and in endeavoring to give life to questions that have passed into history. Led by their egotistical chief, Sir Charles Tupper, the renowned Conservative archæologist, they are actually living in the past and their scenes of labor should be changed to the classical lands where they would doubtless find larger scope for their researches.—Patriot, September 10.

Let us see. What old issues have the Conservative press and candidates, and the Conservative leader, resurrected?

They have referred to the contest of the year 1896, to the fact that for eighteen or twenty years previously the Liberal leaders denounced protection, and to the fact that protection is still in force and effect though the Liberals have been in office for four years. Sir Charles has pointed out that in this regard the Conservatives were admittedly right and the Liberals admitted wrong.




