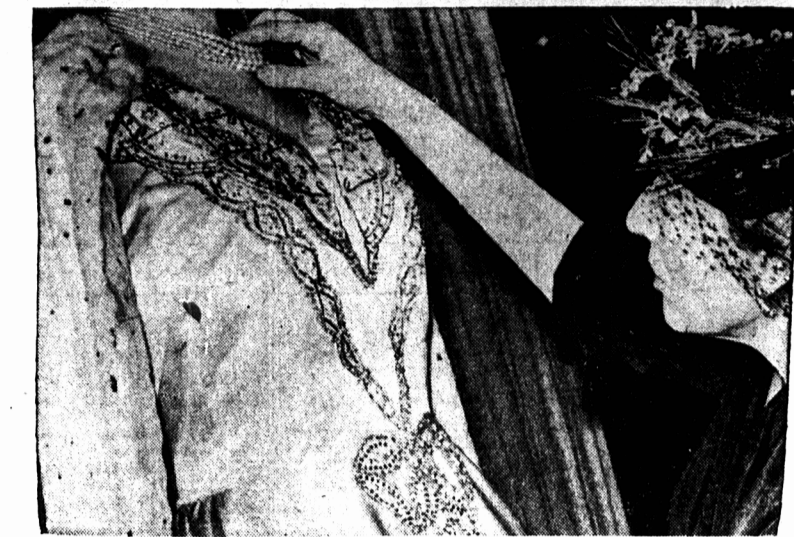

Q. How can I stiffen scatter rugs? A. By stretching them tight and true, and then tacking face down. Sprinkle the backs generously with a solution made by dissolving 1/4 pound of flake glue in 1/2-gallon of water. This should be prepared in a double boiler or a container surrounded by hot water. Allow the rug to dry for twenty-four hours.

Q. How can I make onions digestible? A. Slice them, pour boiling water over them, and allow to remain for two minutes, then plunge into ice water. The onions can be eaten without any after effects.

Q. How can I prevent a bruise from discoloring? A. A bit of sweet oil applied as soon as possible to a bruise will often prevent it from discoloring.

Scrubbing Floors After scrubbing the floor, either wood or linoleum, it is very important, as a final process, to go over the surface with a rag wrung out of clear water. If water is left on wood splinters will soon appear; if left on linoleum, it will produce lumps in the surface.

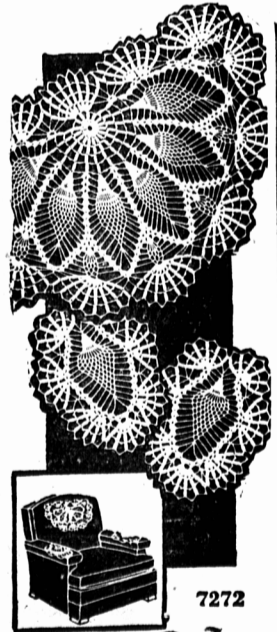
Q. When a man is walking in the rain with a woman who is carrying an umbrella, should he offer to hold it? A. Yes.
