Routine Business For Georgetown Council

GEORGETOWN — Mayor Howard S. MacLean presided over the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council held in the council chambers, on Tuesday night and Councillors Currie, MacLean, Lavers, McConnell and Johnson attended.

Minutes of the last regular

and one special meeting were read and adopted.

Reports were received from the various committees with Councillor Lavers reporting for the financial committee; Councillor McConnell for the public property committee; Councillor Johnson for police and sanitation; Councillor Currie for welfare and street lights; Councillor MacLean for streets and in the absence of Councillor MacDonald, the fire hall committee was given by Councillor Lavers.

It was reported that all clay streets in the Town had an application of calcium chloride applied. Speed signs were erected and a speed warning sign and others were to be erected on Victoria Street. An unsafe top is to be repaired or the well filled in. A culvert is to be installed in the vicinity of Bathurst Marine Office Building. Permission was granted Bathurst Marine Limited and Gulf Garden Foods Limited for the erection of two signs and four flag poles at the entrance of the Town.

The Town Dump has now been fenced and the Council have engaged the services of Joseph Dalton to act as dump caretaker for the month of July and the dump will be open on Tuesdays and Saturdays of each week from 10 in the forenoon to 3 in the evening. Residents of the town have been assessed \$2 per year as a dump tax on property holders and those renting apartments within the Town and a charge of \$2 will be made to all single dwelling owners residing within the boundary of the Georgetown East and West Polling Division for dumping privileges. Owners of commercial cottages will be required to purchase a key to the dump at the annual fee of \$20, as applies to companies and operators of business establishments.

The dump will be locked July 19, and the caretaker will commence his duties at once. Fire Marshall Charles McConnell attended the meeting and a delegation from the Georgetown Lions Club also attended the meeting and discussed with the Council the question of the formation of a volunteer fire fighting brigade. The delegation was given literature by the Town Clerk on this subject and they will report back to the Lions Club and will also hold meetings with the fire hall committee of the council prior to the holding of the next monthly meeting of the Council, when the recommendations arrived at could then be put in the form of a town By-Law forming a fire-fighting brigade.

Bills were approved for payment amounting to \$694.81 and bills were certified as being paid amounting to \$56.65.

The Council approved that a further amount be borrowed from the Royal Bank to meet progress payments approved by Laurie A. Coles and Associates on expenditures on the sewer project now being installed.

The council moved that two residents of the town be named to act with the Town Magistrate as a board of appeal in the case of any person appealing their assessment.

An application was before the council for the use of the skating rink for the 1966-67 season and this matter was left over until the next regular meeting of the council. A request from C. N. Lewellyn to build an addition to his Water Street residence was approved. The Council also granted the Town Clerk two weeks holidays. A list of arrears of car and poll taxes was approved for submission to a solicitor to collect.

AYRSHIRE AWARDS

Two Ayrshire cows bred by Keith Boswell, Victoria, P.E.I. have recently qualified for Gold Seal Certificates by producing 100-100 lbs. milk or more. The certificates are given in recognition of meritorious lifetime production achievements. The cows are all on official R.O.P. test and all have been milked on practical two times a day milking.

Both these cows are classified Excellent and have won prizes at the Atlantic Winter Fair. They are also closely related as they are by the same sire, Leitchcroft Gay Champion, and their dams were sisters.

Lealand's Nina's Flash owned by Almon Wood and Sons, Little York, P.E.I., has produced 116-100 lbs. milk, 4,730 lbs. fat, 4.07 per cent in 4,245 days. In her last lactation at 16 years she produced 15,062 lbs. milk, 639 lbs. fat. She was second at Atlantic Winter Fair in 1963 and she is classified Excellent One Star.

Her sister, Lealand's Royal Flash, owned by Mr. Boswell, has completed eleven lactations producing 102,103 lbs. milk, 4,177 lbs. fat, 4.68 per cent in 4,310 days. She was first at the '64 Atlantic Winter Fair and she is classified Excellent Two Star.
