Information Given.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—Your correspondent, "Business," under cover of professed desire for information, evidently has no objection to circulate reports injurious to the interests of others, without first enquiring as to their truthfulness. He, moreover, betrays an inclination to throw dirt at a public Company, whose record, if weighed by fair principles, can scarcely be considered to deserve ill-will from "Business" men in P. E. I.

Such enquiries seldom appear over reputable men's names.

That delay in the transmission of freight from Montreal is complained of, I readily admit, but that it arises in consequence of a desire, on the part of the Steam Navigation Co., to have the carriage of goods directly from Point du Chene to Charlottetown, I distinctly deny.

Positive orders have been given, long since, that no goods be sent from Point du Chene to Charlottetown by direct steamer, unless so ordered by the shippers. The I. C. Railway make up separate manifests of each freight, and are always anxious to get their cars emptied as soon as they arrive. It is a very rare thing, except very early in the spring, or late in the fall, that the steamer leaves anything behind her at Point du Chene, even for one day, except such as are ordered to go by direct steamer.

If parties who suffer from detention of goods would take the trouble to send in a complaint, authenticated by the shipping note and delivery receipt, such documents would always be sent forward to Moncton by the Steam Nav. Co., to have same investigated at head quarters, and such complaints would do much to cure the inconvenience complained of. Unless complaints are made in due form, the Railways cannot investigate them.

The General Freight Agent of I. C. R., Mr. G. Taylor, has been for some time endeavoring to ensure despatch over these lines; but where so large a quantity of goods, in small lots, often insufficiently marked and consigned to so many different places, are obliged to be packed in cars, to be unloaded, separated and reloaded again at different stations, occasional detentions are not to be wondered at. I think these delays seldom occur with full cars.
