SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Sessional Allowance.

OTTAWA, June 30. About sixty Conservative members have interviewed the Cabinet on the subject of increased sessional indemnity, represented that duration of sessions gradually become longer and might be permanently considered to continue at least four months, that the cost of living at Ottawa was consequently greater, and that expenses of looking after voters lists and other duties rendered necessary under present exigencies of political life were also much greater and were daily increasing, and that sacrifices of time and expenses to which members of Parliament were put were so great that the present allowance of \$1,000 was no longer reasonable indemnity. Deputation strongly urged that indemnity be increased to \$1,500. Mr. Abbott replied that the deputation was making a request of very great importance to the country inasmuch as it involved permanent additional outlay of \$15,000 a year in the expense of legislation. He would give the matter serious consideration.

Differential Duties. LONDON, June 30. The Congress of Chamber of Commerce of the Empire debated Sir Charles Tupper's amendment favoring slight differential duties. The amendment was lost. Erasmus Wisman and two other Canadian delegates voted against Sir Charles's amendment; all other Canadians voted in its favor.

Amendment to Criminal Bill. OTTAWA, June 30. An important amendment has been made to the criminal law bill in the section preventing lotteries. It provides that lotteries in Quebec now operating under provincial statute shall not come under the operation of the bill.

Schooner Lost. HALIFAX, June 30. The three-masted schooner Owasco has been wrecked off Prospect, twenty miles from here. The place where the vessel struck is the same spot where the steamship Atlantic came to grief. The schooner's crew were saved.

The Trappists. MONTREAL, June 30. The blessing of the first abbot of the new Trappist monastery at Oka took place at Notre Dame yesterday. The name of the new abbot is Dom Marie Antoine.

Fire in Belfast. BELFAST, June 30. Haslett's oil and drug stores and eight adjoining houses, including Clarke's auction mart and Mac's stationery warehouse, were burned. The loss is \$500,000.

Foster Secretary of State. WASHINGTON, June 30. The President nominated John W. Foster of Indiana Secretary of State. The Senate has confirmed the nomination.

Crew Saved. NEW YORK, June 30. The steamer Lahu reports that the crew of the ship Fred B. Taylor were taken off by the steamer Trave.

Supreme Court. The Grand Jury submitted their report this morning as follows: The Grand Jury have visited the Jail in this city, also the Poor House and Asylum for the Insane. They found in the Jail 16 persons—14 males and 2 females. The wards appeared clean and as comfortable as they can be made with the facilities at Mr. Harvie's disposal. The Poor House is much crowded by the inmates, particularly in the sleeping rooms. The food looked of a good quality and the patients spoke in kind terms of the treatment they received. The Grand Jury recommended that the situation of the water closets be changed, their location being so near the wards on the west side of the building that these cannot be properly ventilated during warm weather. In the asylum for the insane were found 139 inmates, 67 males and 72 females. The wards, dining rooms and halls were clean and as neat as circumstances will permit, but owing to overcrowding in some of the wards, the patients cannot be as if more room and better ventilation were provided. The beds and bedding appear to have that care necessary to the comfort of the occupants. The bread, potatoes and meat were inspected. The former two were of good quality, but the beef was considered poor. Mr. McDermald, the storekeeper, however, gave the information that it was inferior to what was usually supplied.
