The Jews.
WRITTEN BY AN ISLAND LADY NOW IN DENVER.

If power could be received to-night to roll the great remorseless waves of time back over the remains of buried and almost forgotten nations to the dawn of civilization, to the shore of authentic history, what would we find? A few wandering tribes without fixed habitation near to the heart of nature and quick to obey her teaching. And these tribes alone have withstood the devouring flood of years, before which all the different peoples who at various times swayed the destinies of the world have gone down in the sea of oblivion, leaving no trace of former greatness or grandeur save, perhaps, a carved stone, a few pieces of pottery or sculpture that are brought to the surface by modern antiquarian divers. But these tribes, battling with the elements 4,000 years ago, have ridden the wave instead of yielding, and down through the aeons they have come, bringing their history and their distinguishing characteristics with them.

In the earlier days their lives were that of herdsmen, tillers of the soil, and handicraftsmen of the simplest kind. But in the countless hands into which they were at length carried by the dispersion they were forced to follow quite other paths than those of old. The prejudices of the races among whom they came forbade them the ownership of land, hence commerce became to them the easiest, most natural resource. The success they attained aroused a disposition the trading spirit favored. The trading spirit caused dispersion, which in turn stimulated trading until the Jews were scattered everywhere and became merchants.

Were it not for the Jews we would have no history of religion, as they preserved the Old Testament and in it we find characters that are the admiration and reverence of the world whether Jew or Greek. Is there any other nation that can produce a Moses or an Elijah, or a Christ? And yet these are Jews. By nature the Jews are musicians. In the time of their prophets of old they worshipped God with timber and harp and in more modern times we have Mendelssohn and Rossini. Mendelssohn's father was a convert to Christianity and young Felix was brought up in the Lutheran faith, yet he never forgot the religion of his forefathers. His character was even finer than his genius. What other nation has produced such men?

In literature we have the Psalms, which are read and even sung as reverently in Prince Edward Island as they ever were. In the drama we have Richard the Great, act after act that ever came before the footlights, and even the great Sarah Bernhardt, and even in our own Mother country we had Diarail in my reply to the charge that he was a Jew: "Yes, I am a Jew," and when your ancestors lived in a state of savagery in these Isles, my fathers were priests in the Temple.

The total Jewish population, according to the latest statistics, is six millions three hundred thousand, so you see by that they are not the principal element in any country.

The Jew has ever been accused of trickery but the great Wendling asks: were you ever taken in by a Methodist minister in a horse trade, or a Presbyterian speculator, or an Episcopalian stock broker? The belief that the Jew is dishonest any more so than other people, is one-half nonsense and the other half prejudice.

In regard to the suppression of Jews by the Czar it is impossible that every nation on earth tried it and failed because the Jews are God's own people and have been for four thousand years, and the persecutions they have received stamps them as a people bearing mysterious relation to the plans of the eternal.

News Notes.

Smallpox at Calgary is rapidly dying out, and the general anxiety is abating.
The cholera outbreak in Paris has been traced to the drinking of polluted river water.

The statistics of cholera in the Russian Caucasus are quite appalling—50,000 in one month.
The flour milling concerns of California have formed a combine, with a capacity of 60,000 barrels daily.

A disgraceful bull fight took place recently at Nuits, France, in which two bulls and six horses were killed.
Mrs. Clothilde Robinson, colored, has just died in Detroit, aged 106 years. Her husband died some years ago at the age of 115.

A new coal-field with an ascertained area of one thousand acres has been discovered at Ashton-under-Lyne, Lancashire. Coal was already plentiful in that vicinity.
Toronto's assessment commissioner has decided that a newspaper office is not a manufactory. Making public opinion is an art, not a handicraft.

It is estimated that over six thousand women in the United States act as post-mistresses. The largest number for any one State, four hundred and sixty-three, is in Pennsylvania.

The will of Cyrus W. Field has been filed. The estate is estimated at \$600,000, including life insurance of \$300,000, and is divided among his children.

From 8,000 to 10,000 miners in the Virginia soft coal region show symptoms of relessness, and may join in an effort to compel the operators to sign the scale of wages.

Jean Ingelow's first poems were written on the window-shutters that folded back against the wall, in her old home. Her mother discovered them first, and her brother had them published.

The performance of a bicyclist at Springfield, Mass., who rode his mile from a standing start in 2m. 11s., and of another rider who beat the first by 40 yards in a one-mile race, must be regarded as beating the pacing record of 2:06 made from a flying start.

They have a "Society for the Prevention of Smoke" in Chicago, and it seems to be doing good work in abating the nuisance, for one of the papers informs us that the railroads have all but abolished the smoke of their locomotives, and many of the manufacturers have also complied with the requests of the society. But some stubbornly refuse to reform, and as there is a civic ordinance on the subject, the society means business and is going in for prosecutions, especially against the owners of tugs which pollute the air with dense volumes of smoke. This is a useful kind of society, and similar ones might be started in other cities with advantage.

John Aller, of Pittsburg, was bitten by a dog in 1877. Each year since, on the anniversary of the biting, he has been seized with terrible spasms.

Joseph Colwell, of Birmingham, Conn., wants a wife and offers to marry any good looking girl who will make a balloon ascension with him on August 13.

A Parisian meteorologist has written a book of 300 pages to prove that the electricity of thunderstorms is caused by the friction of rain drops on hailstones.

The most powerful and heaviest gun in the world weighs 135 tons, is 40 feet in length and has a 13 1/2 inch bore. Its range is eleven miles, with a projectile weighing 1,800 pounds.
A remarkable continuance of an inherited practice is that of migratory birds, which are said to cross the Mediterranean at a point proven to have been once the narrowest part of the sea, but which is far from being so now.
