## Eight Island Students Are McGill Graduates

MONTREAL — Eight students from the province of Prince Edward Island were awarded degrees and diplomas at McGill University's annual spring convocation here May 29. They were among 1,248 students to graduate.

Dr. F. Cyril James, principal and vice-chancellor, conferred the degrees during the traditional ceremony. The graduates heard a convocation address by Adlai Stevenson, twice a candidate for the presidency of the United States, who received the honorary degree of doctor of literature.

R. E. Powell, McGill's chancellor, also conferred honorary degrees upon: R.A.C. Henry, consultant in power development on the St. Lawrence Seaway; D.S. Penton, headmaster of Lower Canada College; Prof. D.G. Creighton, chairman, department of history, University of Toronto; and A.D. Pickett, who served for many years with the Nova Scotia department of agriculture.

## NO FATALITIES Safety Award Given Ch'town

A most significant ceremony yesterday afternoon saw Premier A.W. Matheson present to Mayor E.C. Johnstone an award to the city of Charlottetown for having completed the year 1958 without a single fatal accident.

The award which is given by the Canadian Highway Safety Conference previously had been accepted on behalf of the city by Premier Matheson when he attended the annual meeting of the conference in Toronto last month.

In making the presentation, Premier Matheson who is also Attorney General of the province warmly congratulated the mayor in having won this noteworthy distinction. He said it was a reflection on the efficiency of the chief of police and the head of the city's traffic department. He said it was not an easy thing to come through a 12-month period without a traffic fatality and he hoped that such an achievement would be repeated often.

Present for the short ceremony were Hon. B. Earle MacDonald and Hon. A.A. MacIsaac who represent the city in the Island government. Staff Sergeant Augustus Dowling of the city traffic squad was also present for the occasion.
