TP-Ra Program Commences 9th Year

Communally-wide Tuberculin testing of chest cavity positive tuberculin reactors will be launched this year at Parkdale, May 21. This marks the beginning of the ninth successive year in which this method of detection of tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases has been utilized in Prince Edward Island.

Commenting on this method of case finding, Health Minister Dr. F. A. MacMillan reported that since 1956, 37 Islanders were discovered as having active tuberculosis disease through this case finding method. All of these people, following sanatorium and outpatient care have completely recovered.

Dr. MacMillan stressed that in the vicinity of 200 non-tuberculous chest cavity positive reactors were detected through the surveys, such conditions being immediately reported to and treated by the family doctor.

Dr. F. A. MacMillan, president of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League said that the league's mobile x-ray service will continue to be utilized in conjunction with tuberculin testing clinics in the future. In addition to the x-raying of the staff and patient population of local homes for the aged, unit would be used in mass x-ray surveys in high incidence groups.

Dr. MacMillan reported that since it was put into use in 1945, 200 chest x-rays were taken by the league's mobile x-ray unit, with the result that 328 cases were detected.

No Fish For Processors In Souris

SOURIS — The fish filling industry in Souris came to a sudden halt in one plant yesterday and is expected to close down at another today.

Eastern Fisheries Ltd. started processing on Monday with 75,000 pounds of fish landed from the MV Iceland but this was completed at 10 a.m. yesterday.

Ulen Fisheries Ltd. received 2,000 pounds of fish Monday and began processing on Tuesday. They were expected to finish early this morning.

Both plants are expecting trawlers to land today, however, no definite commitments have been made as the trawler fleet is fishing out of radio range of Souris at the present time.

2nd Tax Hike In 2 Years Voted By Souris Board

SOURIS — The annual meeting of the Souris Regional High School board was held last night at the school with the main point of discussion being a 20 cent increase in the school tax rate.

The meeting was under the chairmanship of Camille Gallant of Souris and only 43 of 90 representatives were present. The chairman outlined the past year in the school with special reference to the forthcoming year because of the lateness of the meetings of the rural schools.

Two elections were made to the board of trustees, both men being re-elected. In zone three, Hugh J. MacKinnon, R. O. L. Bay was re-elected and in zone five it was Ernest Underhay, Bay Fortune.

The meeting then discussed the possibility of closing the school for one week during the fall for potato picking and it was decided that the arrangements for this be left up to the board of trustees.

The meeting then adjourned to the latter part of August on a date to be set later.
