### ST. PATRICK'S CONCERT

The concert given in the Opera House on Saturday evening was a fitting termination to the celebration of the Festival of Ireland's Patron Saint. The concert was under the auspices of the Benevolent Irish Society, and it ranks with the best of the many enjoyable entertainments promoted by this time-honored organization. The stage decorations included hand-omely-draped pictures of Queen Victoria, Lord Kitchener and others very much in the public eye at the present time; and the flags of Old England intermingled with the green banners of the society. The audience was large and representative.

The performance began with a selection by the St. Cecilia Club composed of the Misses Murphy, Miss Anderson, Miss Hogan, Miss Gillis and Miss Carroll, which was exquisitely played and generously applauded. A piano trio, skillfully played by the Misses Carroll and Kelly, was also warmly applauded. Prof. Watts' clarinet selections were up to his usual high standard, and the applause with which the number was punctuated testified to the appreciation of all.

Miss Euid McLean gave a patriotic recitation in her usual capable way; and Miss Gillis danced gracefully. These numbers were exceedingly pleasing features of a programme replete with good things.

The vocalists were Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Byrne, Miss Collin, Miss E. Benoit, Mr. Brent McInnis, Mr. L. W. Cook, Mr. Charles Earle, Mr. Howard Dingwell and Master Victor Anderson. That one and all succeeded in pleasing the critical audience was amply demonstrated by the applause which followed the respective numbers. The singing of the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

The concert at Emerald on Saturday evening was another great success. The hall was filled to overflowing, and the performance was greatly enjoyed. An extended report of the performance, kindly forwarded by an esteemed correspondent, is unavoidably crowded out of today's issue.
