

Alberton Lady Observed 100th Birthday Friday

A message from Her Majesty the Queen was a highlight of the one hundredth birthday of Mrs. Thomas Wilkinson, Alberton's oldest resident.

Mrs. Wilkinson was born August 6, 1858 in Charlottetown, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Archibald D. Wyatt. So far as she knows she is the only person now living who was present at the opening of the brick Methodist Church, now Trinity United Church.

As little Martha Jane Wyatt, she remembers walking through the muddy streets of Charlottetown to the beautiful new church. She recalls also the disapproval with which many people saw an organ installed in the church.

The custom of regular church attendance, begun in childhood, continued throughout Mrs. Wilkinson's life. As long as health permitted she was always in the place of worship on Sunday and throughout the week she lived her life according to Christian principles. She has always been interested in the world-wide mission of the church. She is a life member of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and a past president of the Alberton branch of that organization. She is also a life member of the Mission Band in which she was once a leader.

Always she has had a great love for people and one of the chief pleasures of life continues to be visits from her friends.

To an astonishing degree she has retained her interest in cur-

rent affairs, her sense of humor and her ready wit. In conversation she is handicapped by loss of hearing but with loving consideration her daughter passes on to her the content of what is being said.

During the years of her first marriage to Mr. Archibald White she resided in Charlottetown. Immediately following her marriage to Mr. Wilkinson, sixty years ago she came to live in Alberton where she has resided ever since with the exception of ten years spent in Western Canada. She lives with her daughter, Mrs. Helen Kerr, a son, J. Fred White also lives in Alberton. Another son, Mr. Harry White of Saugus, Mass., died a few years ago. His wife, in company with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gray of Melrose, motored to Alberton earlier this week to be present for the birthday celebration. A grandson, Gordon Kerr, motored from Charlottetown. Mrs. Wilkinson has five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

MacCallum Pt. Area Is Sold

MacCallum's point, a sixty-acre triangular section of land in Lower Bedouque, known widely as a scenic picnic, camping, and cottage area, has been purchased by Arnold E. MacLennan, Summerside Pontiac-Buick-GMC dealer, whose summer cottage is one of seven located on this land, with about twenty other cottages nearby.

The land, purchased by Mr. MacLennan from the former owner Fred MacRae of Summerside, includes the point of land from which the long stone breakwater extends with the lighthouse located on the tip which forms the eastern shore line entrance to the harbour.

The point of land now owned by Mr. MacLennan is bounded on the south by Northumberland Strait and on the north by the waters of Summerside Harbour, with island-red sandy beaches on each side. The area commands a splendid view of the Island shoreline in this area, and of the town of Summerside which is about a mile and a half distant by water.

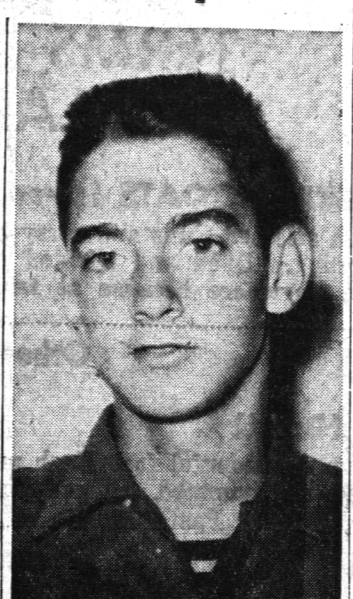
Alberton Student Wins Chem. Engineering Scholarship UNB

An Alberton Grade 12 student, Clair Oliver, has been awarded a four year scholarship in chemical engineering at the University of New Brunswick, sponsored by the International Nickel Company of Canada Ltd.

Scholarships are nothing to Clair who received the Bell Scholarship at the age of fourteen for having the highest entrance examination marks in Prince County. In 1955 he was presented the Governor General Medal at closing exercises in Alberton High School and the following year was the recipient of a Scholarship awarded by the women's Institutes of Western Prince County. In grade 11 last year he was tied for first place place for the Province with a total of 750 out of a possible 800.

The I.N.C.O. Scholarship amounts to \$875.00 per year.

Tignish Legion Members Visit Greenwood Air Base

The Tignish Legion, Branch No. 6, who sponsor the No. 641 Tignish Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Cadets recently sent three of its members to the R.C.A.F. Camp at Greenwood, N.S., to visit the Tignish boys and also all other cadets in camp for a ten days training course.

Going from Tignish on July 17, were Messrs. Joseph J. Arsenault, J. Peter Gaudet and Russell Perry.

From Summerside they went by plane and were met at Greenwood base by W.C. Rhoda, S.L. Langelle, F.O. Hinch, P.O. McLeod and P.O. Larabee.

After being assigned quarters, the guests were escorted around the base on a tour of inspection by R-O McLeod. On the following day, they were present at "The Inspection" and "March Past" by the Air Cadets. At this demonstration the salute and inspection were taken by A.C.E. M. Reyno, A.F.C., DC.

Following the March Past, the Tignish guests were taken on an inspection of the Air Cadet Camp. During the afternoon they attended the finals of the sports events, which were carried on during the ten days the boys were in camp.

The visitors were also taken on a tour of the air base by P.O. McLeod and shown the different types of planes and hangars.

On July 18th, at five o'clock in the evening they left for Summerside by air, much impressed with the manner in which the ten boys of Squadron No. 641 had conducted themselves during inspection and the March Past, and the report on their conduct, sociability and co-operation during the ten days was indeed very pleasing. The boys are being congratulated for their fine appearance and behaviour while at Greenwood R.C.A.F. Base.

The third ship of the United States Navy to visit Summerside this year will be arriving on September 6th, for a two-day visit, Mayor W. A. Currie, has been advised by Rear Admiral H. F. Pullen, R.C.N. Flag Officer Atlantic Coast, who has granted official permission to dock the ship here.

The ship is the USS Havre, an escort vessel carrying a crew of nine officers and 90 men, and the commanding officer is Lt. C. L. Long, USN.

No details have been worked out yet as to the program for the ship's visit, but it is understood entertainment for officers and other ranks will be laid on.

Barn Burned In Severe Storm

A very severe electrical storm, accompanied by torrential rains, passed over East Prince yesterday afternoon. In Summerside the town was without light and power for about a half hour due to the line of the Maritime Electric being knocked out somewhere between Summerside and Charlottetown. This necessitated switching over suddenly at the plant to the two engines which were then in operation. Mr. George Morrison, plant engineer, explained that this sudden load on the two engines brought the voltage down very low but that as soon as the large 1,600 H.P. engine was put in operation the voltage was restored.

At Emerald a large barn owned by Mr. Arthur Lambe was struck and completely destroyed by fire along with three pigs which they were unable to get out in time. Six other pigs were released. Also destroyed was a large amount of feed and pressed hay stored in the barn. A few pieces of machinery stored in the adjoining garage were lost but the family car had been taken out a short time previous.

The Lambe home is about nine miles from Kensington.

The Fire Department from Kensington responded and although they were too late to save the barn did manage to assist in saving the nearby residence.

Mr. Lambe said that due to the assistance of two neighbors,

Messrs. Dan Matheson and Clayton Hughes, who brought along their large sprayer pumps, it was possible to keep the fire from spreading to the home.

At Freetown, the Seales hydro plant was put out of operation when lightning burned out a generator which was in production at the time. Lines serviced by the company in Kinkora and Bedouque area were without power for a time and fuses in a number of transformers were said to have been blown and were being replaced last evening by line crews and electric power was being provided from the Summerside electric light plant whose lines are hooked up with the Seales plant.

SASKATOON (CP) - Dr. Thomas K. Pavlychenko 66-year-old internationally known authority on weed control, died in hospital Tuesday. A native of the Ukraine, Poland Czechoslovakia and graduated as an agricultural engineer in 1927. Dr. Pavlychenko's advice on weed control was sought by a number of governments and his research studies were widely read.
