Georgetown Scores 8-0 Shutout Over Montague

Showing spectacular form, goalie E. Sullivan captured the first shutout of the Kings County Hockey League at Montague last night as the Georgetown Eagles blanked the Montague Meteors 8-0.

From the opening whistle the game was a fast close-checking affair, with both teams fighting to gain the edge. Limmied in for the first few minutes the Meteors battled furiously to relieve the pressure, and were able on long passes to carry the attack to the other end. Georgetown returned again and again to shoot the puck in the corner and battle to get a scramble in front of the net where several of their goals were scored. The Meteors seemingly unable to get a concerted attack organized, moved ineffectually to centre ice where the puck was quickly taken by the Eagles who returned on another attack.

In the second period the heavy roughing got under way, and soon got out of the hands of the referees. The Meteors got a sustained power attack under way in which they held the puck in the Georgetown zone for almost five minutes, but were unable to crack the defense or get by Sullivan.

The tiring teams came out for the last session with a handshake and an onslaught by the Meteors, and again they were forced back by the fast checking Eagles who captured each loose puck. There was no doubt of the supremacy of the Eagles, as even though tired, they continued their pressing attack, shooting from all angles.

Geo'town Eagles 5, Souris Tigers 3

In a regular Kings County Hockey League fixture played in the Georgetown rink on Thursday night, the local Eagles won a 5-3 decision over the Souris Tigers.

The game, played before a packed rink, was the fastest and cleanest on local ice this season. Play hit a fast clip throughout the three sessions, with Eagles putting on a stretch drive in the final stanza to net the two goal margin. After the Tigers had knotted the count, early in the period, Souris opened the scoring when Publicover scored from Stevens at 4:08. H. MacLean drew a penalty and the Tigers scored twice while he was off, MacPhee and Cheverie denting the twines. Landry tied the count on a pass from Johnson at the 15:35 mark. Both goalies were snational and picked off hard drives from close-in breakaways.

The Eagles scored the only marker of the middle session when Stevens countered on a pretty effort. MacPhee for the Tigers tied the count at the 2:55 mark and play was even and fast until the 11:56 mark when the locals could not be denied any longer, as the Eagles bombarded Pierce from all angles, until finally MacConnell, from Stevens and Publicover, beat Pierce on a pretty passing bout in front of the cage. The final goal was scored by hardworking, clever Sammy MacNeill at the 14:06 mark, to complete the scoring. Pierce was sensational on three individual breakaways in this period.

Survey Montague River Channel

Mr. H. R. Millar, government engineer, has completed a survey of that part of the Montague River channel dredged out during the past year. The purpose of the survey was to determine whether or not the desired depth and width of the channel has been dredged as chartered.

From the centre of the channel and sounded to 100 feet on either side through out the whole length of the course, the average channel depth averages 18 to 19 feet at low tide, sufficient to allow any heavy draught ship to enter Montague port.

There still remains two points at the beginning of the second and third courses which require removal and which will undoubtedly be finished this spring since the Dredge 115 has remained over winter in Montague. It is also rumored that an old wharf section adjacent to the Stevens Wharf may be dredged out to make a small boat harbour which would be of considerable advantage to local fishermen.

Exporters anticipate increased activity on the waterfront this spring owing to the channel having been dredged, and it is expected that a large volume of produce will be moved this year.
