

Abbies In First Place In City Hockey League After 10-6 Win Over PWC

The Charlottetown Abbies took over undisputed possession of first place in the City Hockey League last night by defeating Prince of Wales College 10-6 in a cleanly played game at the Forum.

The Abbies raced into a 4-1 lead in the first period and played on even terms the rest of the way as they outscored their younger opponents 6-5. Each team scored three goals in the middle period and the Abbies scored three goals against the Welshmen's two in the final twenty minutes.

Sorel hitmen Melin MacKenzie was up to his old tricks with the hat trick as he scored three goals to lead the winners' assault. Big Joe Coyle, a converted defenseman playing on the forward line, scored twice, while single goals were picked up by playing coach Cecil Dowling, Harold Howatt, Jack Ready, Willie Dunn and Sunny Worth.

MacKenzie, MacFadyen, Dave MacLeod, Arnold MacLean, Doug Cudmore, Joe Revell and Brewer Auld were the Collegians' marksmen. MacFadyen was high point getter for the Welshmen with a goal and two assists. Defenseman Jack Ready had a goal and three assists for the Abbies.

The Welshmen pressed during the opening minutes of the third period when the Abbies were short-handed due to penalties. The outcome of the game might have been different had it not been for some fine netmanning work on the part of Chuck Heistis who stopped several point blank drives during this period.

Harper Retains Title In Draw With Durrelle

CALGARY, (CP)—Doug Harper of Calgary battled Yvon Durrelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B. to a 12-round draw here Wednesday night in the Canadian light heavyweight boxing championship.

Harper weighed 174, Durrelle 171.

Durrelle, who lost the title to Harper in November, came back strong after being floored three times in the second round.

He gradually improved after that and earned points for forcing the fight to the finish.

Judge Tom Kenny voted four rounds for Durrelle, six for Harper and two even. Bob Robinson gave Durrelle five rounds, Harper four and called three even, while Bob Sekirk marked his card four rounds for Durrelle, four for Harper and four even.

It was a rugged fight all the way, butting, fighting through the ropes and other unorthodox tactics being used by both fighters.

Durrelle's wide edge in the second round, Harper is believed to have lost it on a foul. The round had just started when he floored Durrelle with a vicious right. He kept punching as Durrelle slid to the canvas and had to be pulled away by the referee.

Seconds later Harper floored Durrelle for a three-count, then dropped him for a count of nine. Durrelle staggered to his feet and was able to keep Harper off until the bell.

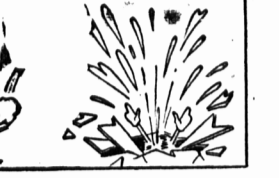

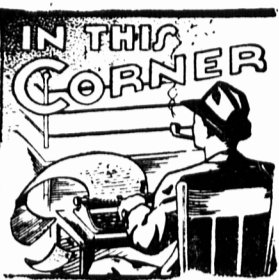

Lamoureux's Trappers could stand some extra help at the moment as they are in quite a tight spot having lost thirteen out of the last fifteen games. Playing for the Trappers is a defenseman named Rudio who was south by Bucko Trainor earlier in the season. For a time Rudio quit hockey but like an old fighter he decided to give it one more whirl.

The Atlantic's Billy Ford apparently likes the wide-open style of hockey played by the Glouce Bay Miners. In two games against the Miners this week Ford picked up five goals and three assists to boost his M.M.H.L. scoring leadership to 12 points over runner-up "Buck" Whitlock. Ford has 56 goals and by the way he is going to play a new M.M.H.L. record in the goal scoring department. The record is 64 set by Buck Whitlock of the Saint John Whiffocks in 1950. The point parade could develop into quite a battle set with the Islanders' Whitlock and Sandon against the Atlantics' Wyat and Ford. It is likely that All Star honors will go to the top men.

BOSTON, (AP)—Boston centre Fleming Mackell broke an 18-game scoreless streak Thursday night with two goals to lead the Bruins to a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over Chicago's improved Black Hawks in Boston Garden.

Mackell was all-star centre last season, but had scored only five goals this campaign, although he had 20 assists going into the game.

After the fourth-place Bruins and the sixth-place Hawks battled through a scoreless first period, Mackell led Boston ahead midway in the second period.

The Hawks—who have lost eight and tied two in 10 games with Boston this season—came back to tie the score on Pete Conacher's close-up shot with only 13 minutes left in the second period. The goal was Conacher's 12th, high for the Hawks.

Mackell got his second goal early in the third period after Johnny Peirson stole the puck from out Jankowski, near the "Chicago" cage and fed Mackell close in.

Wings Come From Behind For 3-All Tie With N.Y.

DETROIT, (AP)—Detroit Red Wings played fumbling, disorganized hockey for the first 50 minutes, then snapped to life in the last 10 minutes Thursday night and tied New York Rangers 3-3 on goals by Marty Pavelich and Marcel Pronovost.

Led by Wally Hergesheimer, who scored twice, the Rangers held a 3-1 lead after two periods. The Wings headed for their second straight victory over the Red Wings at Olympia Stadium, as goalie Johnny Bower was handling everything the Detroiters poured at him.

But his brilliant defence crumbled in the final 10 minutes when Pavelich jumped from the penalty box, took a pass from Gordie Howe and scored a 10-footer. That was at 11:49.

Less than two minutes later, at 13:42, Pronovost split the Ranger defence, converted a pass from Johnny Wilson.

The tie hurt the Rangers' chances of gaining a playoff berth. They fell three points behind the fourth-place Boston Bruins who defeated Chicago Black Hawks Thursday night 3-2.

The victory, meanwhile, boosted Detroit's lead over Montreal to four points.

Nick Mickoski opened New York scoring after only 1:13, drilling a 35-footer over the glove of Wing goalie Terry Sawchuk in the second period. Hergesheimer scored his 21st and 22nd goals of the season. In between these, Dutch Risbel scored in a close-up shot for Detroit's first goal.

Marciano To Turn Down Toronto Bout

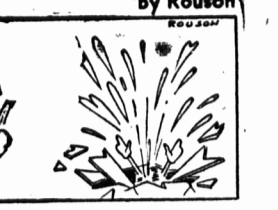

Atlantics Making All-Out Effort To Arrive Here For Game Tonight

The league leading Halifax Atlantics are scheduled to play the Islanders here tonight and Harry Butler, vice president of the Halifax club phoned the Forum last night assuring the Islanders the Atlantics were making an all-out effort to reach Charlottetown despite the stormy weather.

Butler told Forum manager Forrest Clow that the Atlantics were going to New Glasgow by bus last night with the intention of flying to the Island today. If they couldn't fly from New Glasgow they would attempt to come all the way by bus, stated Butler. It was not known if the Atlantics were able to reach New Glasgow by bus. If not they will probably attempt the trip by train.

The Islanders have had the benefit of three days rest since they played in New Glasgow on Tuesday night against Sydney. They will be starting with the same lineup tonight as they used on Tuesday.

Coach Bucko Trainor stated last night that he had forwarded transportation to a hockey player in Central Canada. The player, whose name Trainor refused to release until he arrives, wired the Islanders yesterday to say he had accepted their terms. He is a forward and was sent his transportation yesterday afternoon.

Trainor was also talking with Tommy Gorman of the Ottawa Senators yesterday. Gorman, who had just bought a player from the Pittsburgh Hornets, had no definite promises.

A feature of tonight's game will be the individual point scoring battles between the Islanders' Buck Whitlock and Billy Sandon against the Atlantics' Paul Ford and Pete Wyat.

The Atlantics go into the game with a thirteen point lead over the Islanders. There will be no change in the standings regardless of the outcome of the game but an Islanders win here along with a Sydney win over Glouce Bay would tighten the race considerably. At the moment the Islanders are three points back of the Miners. This includes the two points that the Miners have been awarded until the Charlottetown-Glouce Bay game on January 16 is re-played.
