

Riflemen Selected To Compete In Shootoff

Thirteen riflemen were selected as finalists to compete in a special shootoff to be held here this Wednesday as the result of the third and final qualifying shoot held over the Squaw Point range on Saturday afternoon under the direction of the Provincial Rifle Association. The selection was made on a basis of the highest aggregate score in any two of the three qualifying shoots. The thirteen riflemen will compete Wednesday for positions on the Provincial rifle team that will take part in the inter-Maritime rifle match to be held at Debert, N.S., on Saturday, June 17th. The eight top scores will make up the shooting members of the team in defense of the Maritime title they have held for three years.

Cpl. W. M. Beatty was high man with a total of 203 points, while Lt. J. S. Moore placed second with 201, and G. G. MacLennan, Lt. R. E. Jenkins and Capt. A. J. McCabe tied for third with 198 each. The other eight members who qualified for the final shoot-off are H. T. Vessey, Lt. P. T. Hooper, Sgt. Eric Coles, Ray Andrews, Sgt. G. A. Coles, Lt. B. Jones, Major A. F. Gormley and Capt. R. A. McCabe.

TORONTO, June 11 (CP) — The National Hockey League's Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens found out today that a baseball can be almost as slippery and tough to hold as the puck they chase around during the winter season.

The two clubs galloped and slid around Toronto Maple Leaf Stadium in a nine-inning game. After 3 1/2 hours of play, 36 runs and as many hits and 11 errors (Montreal had seven), Leafs took the honors by a thumping 27-9 score.

It gave 12,886-shirt-sleeved fans who paid \$12.379 into Manitoba's Flood Relief Fund a chance to cheer their beloved Leafs and boo—all good-naturedly, of course—the Montreal villains, particularly Maurice (The Rocket) Richard, Ken Reardon, Butch Bouchard, Billy Reay and others.

Proximity Wins Golden West Trot

ARCADIA, Calif., June 11 (AP) — Heavily-favored Proximity captured the \$50,000 Golden West Trot at Santa Anita park Saturday, and did it with a record-breaking performance for 1 1/4 miles.

With her regular pilot, Clint Hodgins of Glendeboro, Ont., handling the reins, the eight-year-old mare won the race by three old man lengths with a clocking of 2:31.2-5. The record for a mile course was set by Rodney in winning this same Golden West Trot in 1948 at 2:31.3-5.

Proximity, richest money-winning harness horse of modern times, finished ahead of Chris Spencer. Even Hanover was third in the field of eight standard breeds.

Proximity paid \$3.10, \$2.20 and \$2.20.

In taking down \$25,200 for first place, Proximity boosted her lifetime earnings to \$180,320.67. She was purchased by her owners, Ralph and Gordon Verhurst, of Victor, N. Y., five years ago for \$1,000. The Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P. E. I., and New Glasgow, N. S., drove Cherokee Chief to victory in the seventh race, a one-mile pace. His time was 2:06.2-5. He also placed second in the wind-up affair, the Seal Beach one-mile pace. Lady Fraser of Forest, Ont., driving Dr. Stanton, won the event in 2:03.1-5. O'Brien drove Prince Jay.

Nine Race Horses, Caretaker Die In Stable Fire

CHICAGO, June 11 (AP) — Fire raced through a stable Friday night and killed a stablehand and nine race horses, including one valued at more than \$100,000. The flames raged a big barn on the Emil Denmark farm near suburban Hinsdale, Frank Nemecek, 48, a groom, died.

Denmark, a Chicago automobile dealer, estimated his loss at \$385,000.
