ANNIVERSARY PROCLAMATION.
Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, The due and proper celebration of the twenty-sixth day of April as the anniversary of Oddfellowship in America is sanctioned by immemorial custom, and in observance of the standing resolution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, now, therefore, I, Charles M. Busbee, Grand Sire, by virtue of the authority vested in me by law, do hereby recommend and enjoin upon all Grand and Subordinate Bodies under the jurisdiction of the Order to devote the twenty-sixth day of April, A. D. 1891, (or, as the twenty-sixth day will fall on Sunday, the twenty-fifth or the twenty-seventh day of April, as may be selected) the seventy-second anniversary of the Independent Order of Oddfellows in America, to suitable and appropriate exercises in commemoration of the day, and to public thanksgiving to Almighty God for His manifold blessings vouchsafed to us, as an Order and as individuals, during the past year.

Done at the City of Raleigh, State of North Carolina, this twenty-seventh day of February, Anno Domini, eighteen hundred and ninety-one, and of the Order, the seventy-second year.

The encampment branch has entered Sweden—a dispensation having been sent out for the first subordinate to be instituted in M. J. mo.

The Encampments in British Columbia have petitioned for a charter for a Grand Encampment, which will doubtless be granted. That will make two grand bodies instituted in Canada since last session of the S. G. L., the G. E. of Manitoba having been in existence now for some months. What are the Patriarchs of the Lower Provinces doing? They have had a sufficient number of subordinates in that jurisdiction for some years, but they have not managed to get up enough enthusiasm to ask for a Grand Encampment. Quebec is a small field for the Encampment branch and has only three subordinates; but we should not be surprised to see a Grand Encampment there before our brethren in the Lower Provinces wake up.

The Order in Indiana has lost by death a true and worthy leader in the person of P. G. M. John W. McQuady. For many years his name has been identified with Oddfellowship in this State. It will be, for his whole time is devoted to the work, occupying as he did the position of Secretary to a large Oddfellows' Relief Association in Indianapolis, and serving as official instructor for the State. In both these positions, as well as in the more honorary one he has filled, he did noble work, and helped perhaps more than any other single man to advance the interests of the Order in Indiana, and made it the flourishing institution it is to-day. Nor in his own State alone was he conspicuous in our fraternity. As a representative and an officer and subsequently as a continuous visitor in the Sovereign Grand Lodge, he had become the familiar acquaintance and personal friend of many of the leading Oddfellows of every section of the continent. It is not in Indiana only that he will be missed and mourned. Regret for his loss will be felt wherever he was known, and a large measure of sympathy will be extended to the friends of the departed brother and to the Order of his State in their bereavement.

SOURCE OF OUR STRENGTH.—Just here let me say that the strength of this great order rests in its subordinate lodges; in the character of their individual members; in the steady, practical performance of the duties of the hour; in the constant and practical discharge of their obligations to each other. In these days of magnificence and displays, let us seek to keep well in view the foundation principles of this great order found in the lessons taught and the duties to be performed in the subordinate lodge.

Let us look within a lodge of Oddfellows, get behind, so far as we can, the curtain that veils its proceedings. The lodge is called to order, the minutes read, and the first inquiry is, does any brother know of a sick brother or brother in distress. If there be a member of that lodge whom disease has over-powered or upon whom the hand of misfortune is heavily laid, he is assured from that moment of the sympathy, the aid, the active pity of every member of the lodge. I do not go further into the business of the lodge. I have struck the corner-stone of Oddfellowship, this duty of practical brotherhood. It has carried brightness into many a darkened home, and sent a thrill of joy into many a despairing soul.

News Notes.

The assessment of Winnipeg for 1891 is \$20,000,000 and its population 27,000.

Frost has caused damage to fruit and farm produce in Alabama, Georgia and Florida.

Large numbers of people, chiefly of the farming class, are at present emigrating from Ireland.

The cashier, books and all the money of the Hull City Bank, Lead City, S. D., are missing.

The London Standard estimates that the world's wheat crop is very short, and predicts brisk demand and high prices.

Lady Zeland and Miss Balfour were warmly welcomed on their tour of the Achilli Islands. A number of triumphal arches were erected, bearing the legend, "God bless Balfour and Zeland."

The Russian government will take no diplomatic steps to prevent the re-appointment of Prince Ferdinand to the viceroyalty of East Rumania, but will decline to recognize the prince in any capacity.

A number of French capitalists have made an offer to the Russian government to build the Siberian railway from Tchela-busk to Vladivostok, a distance of 7,198 versts, receiving payment either in railway bonds or by a loan of 300,000,000 credit roubles.

At noon on Monday, March 30th, six men in Detroit started to do without sleep for 168 hours. One of them, named Cunningham, succeeded in accomplishing the task. Townsend, the old-time pedestrian, avoided sleep 150 hours, and then collapsed. He exhibits strong symptoms of insanity.

A great sensation has been caused at Cannes by the announcement that the Grand Duke Michael Michaelovitch, a cousin of the Czar, has been privately married to the Countess of Werenberg, daughter of the Duke of Nassau, at San Remo. The Duke of Nassau and the young couple left Cannes a few days ago ostensibly for a visit to Genoa.

Prince Louis Napoleon, whom his father has designated as his successor, as far as it lay in his power to dispose of what is in any case an uncertain heritage, is said to be a young man of high character and more than ordinary ability. Prince Napoleon ascribed to him considerable capacity for leadership and recommended the supporters of the cause to rally round him, if they should ever stand in need of a captain in the field.

Niccolò Davita, an Italian, was shot and killed in the public market place at Syracuse, N. Y., on Tuesday night by a fellow-countryman named Antonio Guglielmi. The men occupied adjoining fruit stands, and a feud is said to have existed between them for years. Guglielmi, who was one of the wealthiest Italians in the city, claims that Davita drew a knife on him and he fired in self-defence.

At the first public meeting of the National Federation at Dublin, on Tuesday, it was announced that an account in John Dillon's name had been overdrawn to the extent of \$15,000, and that there were other liabilities to the amount of \$40,000. It was resolved to call upon Messrs. McCarthy and Parnell to immediately release the sum from the fund held in Paris sufficient to meet the present and future liabilities.

A Sight Worth Seeing.

Probably few persons ever saw the breathing apparatus of a human being laid open for inspection. From a hospital cadaver, we once saw the lungs and bronchial tubes removed, and blown up as a boy would a bladder or toy balloon, until the fine bronchial tubes and air coils of the lungs were distended to the fullest extent. In this state the lungs were hardened by immersion in alcohol, so that they remained expanded when the air was let free. With a sharp knife the wind-pipe and lungs were split open, so that it was easy to trace the bronchial tubes gradually diminishing in size from the wind-pipe itself, becoming finer and more delicately branched, until smaller than fine sewing cotton, these tiny bronchi lead into the air-cells beyond, to convey air to sustain life.

Truly a wonderful sight, which we have often recalled during the past winter as we read of the great number of deaths from pneumonia and bronchitis. Nearly 250 deaths in Boston in the month of January.

It seems impossible to most people that so common and simple a disease as bronchitis should cause death at all.
