TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The London Riots. LONDON, Feb. 11. Everything is quiet in the metropolis, tradesmen have re-opened their shops, and business is proceeding as usual. At a meeting last night of the Mansion House Committee, the Lord Mayor announced that subscriptions for the relief of the workmen out of employment had been received to the amount of £3,500, including £1000 each from Baron Rothschild and the banker, and £1000 from Lord Salisbury.

Mr. Schreiber denies. OTTAWA, Feb. 11. Mr. Schreiber says that the house at Bathurst called Inch Arran, is owned by him, but that the statement that free passes are given to persons going to that place, or to persons connected with it, are false. So far as he is concerned he knows of no one getting free passes.

Exaggerated Despatches. OTTAWA, Feb. 11. The telegraphed statements about a mutiny of the Mounted Police stationed at Edmonton are much exaggerated. A few of the men, guilty of acts of insubordination, have been arrested, and are to be tried by court-martial. Mr. White, Comptroller of the Mounted Police, expects further information.

Steamer Ashore. ST. JOHN, Feb. 12. The steamer Cambridge, of the Boston and Bangor line, went ashore on the Maine coast early on Wednesday evening. She immediately keeled to starboard and commenced filling. She will undoubtedly be a total loss. No lives lost.

Found Guilty. LEIPZIG, Feb. 11. Capt. Sarauy was to-day found guilty of having furnished plans and information of the German fortifications and armaments to the French military authorities, and was sentenced to twelve years penal servitude.

For Active Service. ATHENS, Feb. 11. Two more classes of the Greek naval reserve have been summoned into active service. The Greek fleet, in the Gulf of Volontheasealy, has been ordered to return to Salamis, near Athens.

The Marquis of Lorne. LONDON, Feb. 11. The Marquis of Lorne has accepted the position of Honorary Commissioner for India at the coming Colonial Exhibition, and also the Presidency of the Canadian Commission.

Not Confirmed. VIENNA, Feb. 11. The new Free Press has received a telegram from Belgrade, saying that the reports that King Milan has ordered the disbandment of his troops are not confirmed.

An Irish Election. GALWAY, Feb. 11. In the Parliamentary contest to-day, O'Shea had 1,107 votes and was elected. Lynch received 652. The vote for Lynch was purely formal.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Sir,—No one, I presume, will attempt to deny that Senator Howlan is the first to advocate the construction of a Subway across Northumberland Straits. But as regards the first to advocate the tunnelling of these Straits, there appears to be some difference of opinion. At the Subway meeting in Belfast, a Mr. Lord claimed the credit of originating the tunnel scheme, which, if I am correctly informed, was not disputed by anyone present, among whom was one other prominent advocate of the tunnel. How far back Mr. Lord dates his claims to tunnel notoriety I am not prepared to say, but I am strongly of the opinion that he was not the first to propose the undertaking. In a lecture (a printed copy of which is now before me) delivered before the Charlottetown Young Man's Christian Association, in the Temperance Hall, on Thursday, the 10th day of April, 1887, by the Rev. Daniel McCurdy, of the Presbyterian Church, Nova Scotia, Captain Orlebar, R. N., President of the Institution, in the chair, at page 17 I read as follows:—"Your fair Island must be placed more directly in contact with those great public works which are destined, at no distant day, to speed the iron horses from Cape Breton to Lake Superior, and thence to the shores of the Pacific. Stranger things have taken place within the memory of man. The Straits of Northumberland must be tunneled, and the telegraphic wires extended from America to Europe. The ends of the earth are yet to be brought together, at speaking distance, on friendly terms, for commercial, social and religious purposes. Prepare to take your proper sphere in these coming enterprises." &c. If any of our politicians advocated the tunnelling of the Straits prior to the date when the Rev. Mr. McCurdy gave the lecture from which I have just quoted, the public would doubtless like to hear from them.

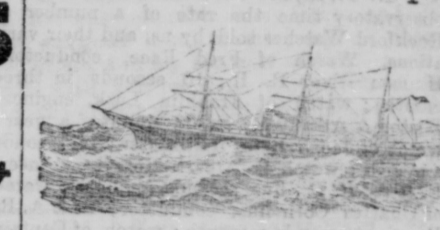

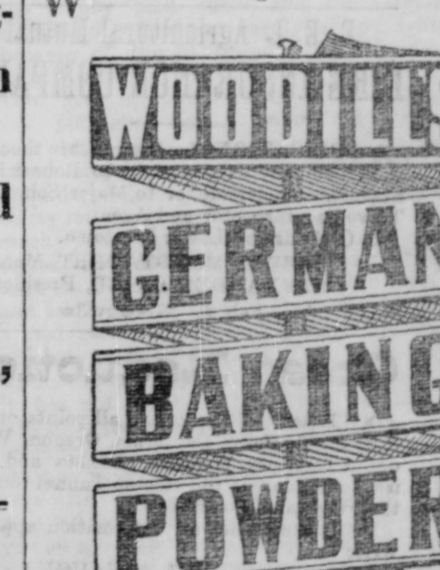
