The thrill which Prince Edward Island scouts enjoyed when the Queen and Prince Phillip visited their Jubilee Jamboree camp in Sutton Park, Warwickshire, England is described in today's despatch from Assistant Scout Master Lloyd Matthews of the Island contingent.

"Today happened the great event to which most of the boys have been looking forward to for days. That is the visit of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip to this camp.

"They arrived at 12:30 coming through our Jubilee entrance gate. Then they went to visit the hospital where they spoke to some of the patients. From there they went to the review of special representatives of each contingent at the Jamboree. This was at 3 p.m. Afterward the Royal Couple had tea with contingent leaders from each country.

"Then they visited the American camp for a brief visit. From there they went to the Rover Moot which is being held here in conjunction with the Jamboree. There is also an Indiana Jamboree for Scouts, here.

"Ross Davidson, an assistant scout master from Kensington, is representing Prince Edward Island at this gathering.

"In the parade of special representatives reviewed by the Queen were Roger Craig and Roscoe Pendleton representing our province."

"The despatch for the previous day describes a visit to Windsor Park where they saw the Girl Guides in camp with a special mention of Margaret Coffin of Summerside."

"Today we left at 10 a.m. for a conducted tour to Windsor and a visit to the Girl Guide camp there. There are about 400 Guides from all over the world at Windsor Park.

"We arrived at Windsor Station by train at 2:15 and marched to the camp about two miles away. There were some 400 scouts in our party from Belgium, Italy, England, Scotland and France in addition to our own Canadians.

"When we arrived at the camp we were broken up into groups of five and shown around the camp by girls of different nationalities. We were served supper by each group before we left on return to our own campsites. On the train trip back everyone agreed that he had a good time. We arrived home at 11:30 after a four and one-half hour journey.

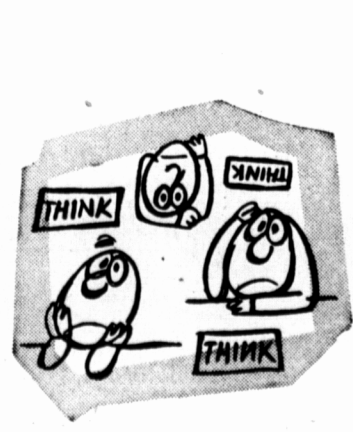

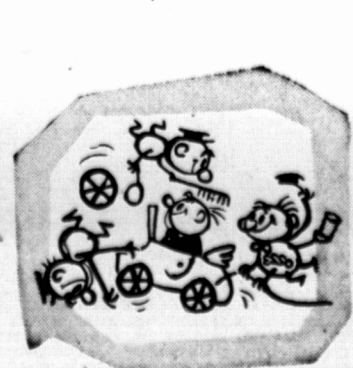
