Advantage of a Strong Physique.

The London World, in speaking of the late Lord Napier of Magdala, notices as a remarkable fact his indifference to being wounded. He seemed to take little account of being shot as quite an ordinary affair, and recovered from his wounds with surprising rapidity. Two of his wounds, it says, he had not cared to notice at all in his record of service furnished to Hart's Army List. He was severely wounded at Ferozshah in December, 1845, but had recovered in time to take part in the battle of Sobrasa seven weeks later. Before Multan, in the middle of September, 1848, a cannon shot all but took his leg off, but he was marching and fighting again by the second week in November. On the 12th of January following he was severely wounded in the trenches, but he was able to march several hundred miles across country, and fight at Gujeret one month later to a day. He was shot in the first relief of Lucknow, but nevertheless rode out the next day and brought in the rear guard, after which, throughout the blockade he did continuous and arduous service. At a second relief he was severely wounded, but this did not hinder him from taking up the active duty of chief engineer at Alumbagh a few days later. No man ever had more the mens sana in corpore sano.

Keep the Commandments.

Turn and listen to the simple universal rule given by our Lord, the rule which all can understand and all can accept—Keep the Commandments. If thou wouldst enter into life, if thou wouldst know the good, you need not hurry about the world after this rabbi, and you need not hunt up the secret in the baffling masses of wrangling philosophers; you need not run to and fro and waste yourself with trouble and anxiety, in terror lest you should have missed the true receipt or taken the wrong training; you need not lose yourself in endless disputes and enquiries. No, it is all perfectly plain how it is to be done.

There is no royal road peculiar to the privileged, no doubt about it which can entitle you to defer it to to-morrow. Why ask concerning the good as if it were a curious riddle which lacked an answer? If thou wouldst enter into life there is one receipt, and that is open to you and to all—Keep the Commandments. The Commandments! They are points at which the will of man closes with the will of God. They are the moments at which this fusion occurs.

The Commandments express the very nature and character which constitute the enormous goodness of Him who is the only good, and in keeping them we come into touch with Him; we are made one with Him; they embody the temper in which communion takes place. Whenever we loyally keep a Commandment then our will is God's will, and we unite the good and become one.—Canon Scott-Holland.

A Poisonous Practice.

If housekeepers everywhere would start and maintain a crusade against the sale of undrawn poultry in the markets or by farmers, it would work a most wholesome hygienic reform, says Good Housekeeping. It is a vicious practice, an abuse, in fact, that people have endured, as they have many other abuses, because there is no remedy except in concerted action or legislation. It is impossible to keep undrawn poultry even a few hours without the beginning of putrefaction from the effects of the gases from the undigested food in the "crop" and intestines. The longer it is kept, the more of the poison goes into the flesh, and in the majority of cases, the poultry that reaches the kitchen from the market is actually unfit for food. Housekeepers could well afford to pay larger price to have the poultry dressed immediately upon being killed—they pay for much weight that is thrown away, as it is, besides having left a mass of poisoned flesh. It is urged that some people prefer the flavor of undressed poultry, but that fact only makes the matter more alarming, since it indicates that we are cultivating a taste for putrid meat.

The Conemaugh Again

JOHNSTOWN PARTIALLY SUBMERGED BY THE UNGOVERNABLE RIVER.

A Johnstown, Pa., special sent late on the night of the 10th says: A large part of the town is flooded, but the highest point seems to have been reached. The water has overrun the banks of the Conemaugh, and the whole borough of Woodvale is flooded to a depth of from two to four feet. In one section twenty dwellings are under water, and two frame houses have been floated from their foundations. The water is flowing into Market Street from the Conemaugh, and as the point has been filled up to a height of about nine feet a basin has been created which is filling up. The water is about a foot deep on both streets around the Club House, and the Morrell House is surrounded by three feet of water. The Western Union office is surrounded by a depth of several feet. The illuminating gas plant is all under water and no light was given last night. Part of the Popular Street bridge is gone and the Cambridge Bridge has been washed away. The ground is gradually washing away where the stone wall fell in on the banks of Stoney Creek, and it is feared the foundations of a number of dwellings may give way. The Cambria Mills have been closed. The Pennsylvania railroad embankment near bridge No. 6 was badly washed away and one track has disappeared in the river. The flood was caused by heavy rains on Tuesday night.
