

Keen Competition At Queen Square School Sports Last Evening

Featured by keen competition, expert skating, a screaming crowd and a hockey game the annual Queen Square School Sports were held at the Charlottetown Forum last night before a crowd of about 1,800 kids and adults.

The well conducted program, which lasted about two hours and a half, was run off under the guidance of Leo P. MacDonald, principal of Queen Square School, Jim MacCallum and starter Brigadier Bill Reid.

The Teddy Flanagan coached Queen Square hockey team rounded out the sports program with a convincing 12-2 victory over Montague High School.

But the most competitive part of the program was the ice racing. Boys of all ages competed in these classes and the competition in some of the events was as close as the Old Home Week racing program.

Only the relays and two or three of the other events were one-sided. Queen Square won the interscholastic race from Montague and Grade X won the Inter-Class relay without too much trouble.

The members of the Interscholastic relay team were Angie Carroll, Ernie Praught, Merrill Pineau, and Griffin. The Grade X Inter-Class team was composed of Angie Carroll, Donnie Whelan, Paul MacEachern and Ernie Praught.

Angie Carroll won the biggest number of individual honors. Angie had firsts in the races for boys over 15 years, the quarter-mile open, potato race and backward race.

Donnie Whelan was runner-up with four seconds. Young Whelan had seconds in the races for boys over 15 years, boys 15 years old, the backward race and the accuracy race.

A novelty event this year was the accuracy race. The competitors lined up at the South end of the rink, raced to the wire at the north end where they were confronted with a problem in addition. Upon completion of the problem they raced back to the south end with the answer. The winner was P. Smith.

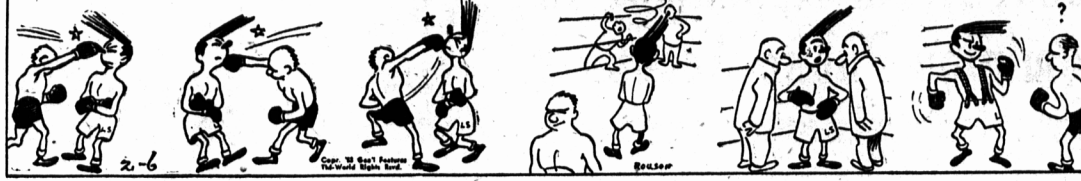

IN THIS CORNER
The back-to-back series beginning in Halifax tonight between the Islanders and the Atlantics is the most important of the current M.H.L. campaign. A double victory for either one team or the other and the dispute for first place in the league standings would be all but settled. The Atlantics currently lead the Islanders by five points and could increase this margin to nine by taking the series. If such should be the case then they will have a stranglehold on first place. After Saturday night's game the teams have only 21 more contests to play and the Islanders were to play the Atlantics enough to overcome a nine-point margin.

On the other hand two straight victories for the Islanders would move the Charlottetown team to within one point of Halifax. A double Charlottetown victory at this stage of the game would all but knock the props from under the Atlantics and the Islanders would likely be in first place to stay by next week. Should the teams split, then its going to be a dog-eat-dog scrap down the stretch to the wire.

The Islanders unbeaten streak finally came to an end last night in Glace Bay. The old law of averages was bound to catch up with the team sooner or later and the improving Miners were the ones who dictated that law. It has been quite a while since the Islanders lost a game in Glace Bay and that victory by the Miners would be well received by the Bay fans. The Miners are now riding well ahead of Sydney and officials of the Glace Bay club believe that they are a strong contender for League play-off honors.

Now that the Islanders have that bad game out of their system they may be ready to turn the works on Halifax. The Atlantics hope to have Billy Ford back in action for tonight's game. High scoring Billy has been out of the lineup for two weeks with a foot infection and according to reports the foot is well enough to enable him to meet up with Ronnie Hurst once more. Saturday night when the Atlantics came back here Hughie Campbell will be playing his first game against the Islanders since he was suspended two weeks ago.

Intercollegiate hockey returns to Charlottetown tonight with Saint Dunstan's University meeting Mt. Allison. The Mounties come here highly regarded. They have been on ice since early in December and have had quite a number of exhibition games. The Saints on the other hand have had only three weeks of practice and two exhibition contests. The wearers of the Red and White, however, have improved considerably over last year and rank as a threat in the N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate picture.

While the Saints hockey team is in action here their basketball squad will be playing Mount Allison at Sackville. For the highly rated S.D.U. basketball team this is their stiffest game of the season to date. The Mounties had little trouble in disposing of U.N.B. and St. Thomas last week. They were barely beaten out by Dalhousie in an exhibition game two weeks ago, so that Saints know full well they are meeting their acid test. If the Saints can win tonight they will be heavy favorites to take the N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate hoop crown.
