Unemployed Figure Similar To Year Ago

As seasonal unemployment climbed to its annual peak, the members of people drawing unemployment insurance benefits through the National Employment Office in Charlottetown reached the 2,000 mark yesterday. The figure is about the same as it was on the same date a year ago.

Only the counties of King's and Queen's are included in the total. Prince County claims are paid by the National Employment Office in Summerside.
Charlottetown's share of the 2,000 people drawing benefits, and the remainder, 1250 are scattered all over King's and Queen's Counties. Those living in or near Charlottetown are paid over the counter at the local office once a week at the rate of 150 per day. The Charlottetown total takes in a considerable number of people who live on the outskirts, and those who reside a few miles outside the City boundaries.

The 1250 claimants in the county districts, as well as in the larger communities of Souris and Montague are paid every two weeks by mail.
Three hundred and fifty claims were taken by the Charlottetown office this week with an exceptionally heavy rush on Monday and Tuesday.
On these opening days of the week there was a steady line-up of people waiting to file claims and a large number were received by mail. To keep pace with the work, members of the staff worked overtime every night in the week, preparing the new claims and organizing for the payment next day of older claims.

People doing business at the office, said members of the staff, averaged at least three hundred per day throughout the week. In addition it was pointed out that more than twelve hundred people who have filed claims by mail were looked after. The latter entail much paper work and hundreds of dollars in postage each month, and are more difficult to handle than claims taken and paid over the local office counter. Explanations of the unemployment insurance are easier to explain in person than by letter.
Last year the total claims reached a high point in February of almost 2500. This year because of recent amendments in the Unemployment Insurance Act, it is expected the figure will be somewhat higher. No big drop is foreseen in the number of claimants until April 15th on which date the type of payments, known as supplementary benefits, automatically ceases.

Welfare Bureau Discusses Relief Problem In City

Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone and A. Walthen Gaudet, members of the Finance Committee of the Charlottetown City Council, were guests of the Board of Directors of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau at a regular monthly meeting on Wednesday. The Councillors accepted an invitation to hear the Bureau's views on the problem of relief in the City, and to discuss that problem with the Bureau's directors.

Dr. Frank MacMillan, Frank O'Neill and Brendan O'Grady directed the informal brief.
Incidental to these primary welfare services of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau have been severely curtailed due to the extremely heavy demands upon the Bureau for direct relief.
The Bureau was organized, it was explained, to perform needed services in the fields of child welfare, family welfare, guidance and rehabilitation. Besides placing children in foster homes, arranging adoptions, caring for unwed mothers, and offering guidance by a trained social worker to hundreds of persons every year, the Bureau maintains a home-nursing service under the direction of a registered nurse, and provides professional medical attention for the needy.

After two hours of informative discussion the meeting was adjourned by the chairman, Dr. L. I. Duffey.
A report on the year's work will be presented at a public meeting of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau on Jan. 26.
