HOW THE CARELESSNESS OF MEN CAUSES THE WOMEN NEEDLESS WORK.

Books, papers, magazines, almanac and memorandum are routed from their place—and when you have to leave, what a time there is there! No one knows where your things are. You cry—

"Where is my hat! Where is my overcoat! Who had my gloves?"

Every one in the house is put upon the witness stand, and it is more trouble to get you started down town than to launch a steamer or to start a new stage coach. Then, after you are gone, the women must spend a quarter of a day, more or less, in picking up things you have scattered. The trouble is, you don't think. It would take you but a moment to hang up your coat and hat, and put your gloves in your coat pocket, to draw your neck-wrappers through the sleeve of overcoat, and to cultivate your bump of order. It takes but a moment to put an article in its place, and then it can always be found ready.

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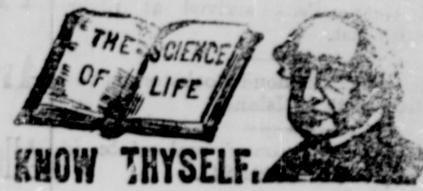
